

SKIING THE WASATCH (in Utah, that is)

Last month Dick and Julie King and Geoff! Wadey had a great time skiing in Utah. Snow conditions were good although the snow depths were less than usual for February - March. They compared the skiing at Park City, Park West, Alta and Snowbird. Park City has the greatest variety of skiing (and the U. S. Shi Team serves a roast beef sandwich you wouldn't believe for about a buck). Park West (which is little known and uncrowded - named in jest by Geoff' as Wisp West) has some of the longest and most demanding slopes. Alta has unbelievably superb snow and delightful skiing conditions, but gets crowded on weekends. Snowbird has all firstclass facilities (and prices!), but the big tram is a bit of a delusion, since the best skiing is off the chairs. Some of the best slopes at Snowbird were all chopped up into deep-gullied

short-ski moguls that were no fun unless you like to jump all the way down.

Geoff' had fun on the steep moguled slopes but had trouble with deep cut-up snow.
