

Early in the season, reports of NO SNOW and warm temperatures in Aspen plagued the March 77 trip. Several people cancelled. But, those of great faith who hung in there were well rewarded!

The trip began at beautiful Baltimore-Washington International Airport with a smooth check-in (except for one - there is always ONE - unfortunate who left his ski boots in Annapolis!). We arrived in Denver at approximately 5:00 P.M. and boarded our charter bus which took us through the tall mountains to the pnetty little town of Aspen. Upon our arrival, one half of our total group headed by Jay Obenfield of the Goddard Ski Club unloaded at the Tirolyan Inn; eleven of our group stayed at the historic and old Jerome Hotel in the center of town, and four went to the Gant — luxury condominiums on the east side of town. Anxious about our first day of skiing upcoming; and dog-tired from the long journey from BWI airport, we all turned in for a good night's sleep (even though we did gain two hours of daylight from the westward flight). Well, it was NOT a good night's sleep for everyone! The Jerome Hotel group experienced some rude awakenings when the hot water radiator pipes began to "sing" at about four A.M.! In fact, it seemed as if the ENTIRE building was parked on the

end of the runway and was about to take off!

Sunday, March 6th, was a beautiful day! Everyone was up early and had a delicious but expensive breakfast at the Hotel (the Abrahams and Geoff' Wadey wandered off to Andre's for their first meal). The group then attached the slopes in full gear. As the cloudless 40° day wore on, various articles of clothing were shed. Needless to say, everyone was sunburned by the end of the day, and the obvious need for tons of sun screen lotion for the rest of the week was most apparent. Asse Berling turned almost as red as her beautiful red hair! The rest of the group did not fair much better. Generally, each day, everyone chose a new area to ski - Aspen Mountain, Aspen Highlands, Buttermilk or Snowmass. There was something for everyone - even cross country shiing at Ashcroft. According to our group expert, Rachael Abraham, the cross country instructor was both very demanding and very good. Rachael had seven full days of this! Snow conditions were good until Wednesday when bare spots began to appear near the bottom due to the 50° plus weather. THEN - Wednesday night it snowed; and Thursday it snowed! For those who braved the cold (20°) temperature, the skiing was PHANTASTIC! This one day made the whole trip worthwhile! Other than occasional hangovers, there was only one injury in the group: that was by trip leader Ray McKinley! Ray twisted his knee of the third day out. In spite of that, Ray had three glorious days which he can talk about "from here to eternity". During the week, most of the group joined in on wine, cheese and coldcut luncheons on the slopes of Snowmass. After stuffing ourselves, we even tried some racing — with times ranging from 16.9 seconds to 23.0 seconds. (Editor's Note: The author failed to note here the length of the course raced, nor did she mention the length of the luncheon period or the amount of wine consumed!).

Of course, we did not ski ALL of the time. We left plenty of time to participate in those other two pleasures: EATING and DRINKING. Good food and pleasant restaurants abound in this ski capitol. Elegant meals at Don Giovanni (ask Geoff' about the magician there), Crystal Palace (waiters and waitresses put on a great show) and at the Copper Kettle are confirmed. For lower cost, blue jean meals, there is the Aspen Mine Company, the Alcapaleo Gold, and

Little Annie's.

It was really a great trip. We had only two complaints at the end of the trip: a) it was 700 SHORT; and b) there was not enuff she-ing and he-ing! Oh well, MAYBE NEXT YEAR!

As an adjunct to the Aspen Ski Trip Report, we have NOTES ON ASPEN, by Geoff Wadey

By contrast to many places I have skied, I was greatly impressed in Aspen by the number of young, genuinely friendly helpful people all over the place. They contributed greatly to our daytime and nighttime enjoyment. As for the daytime enjoyment, at Aspen I skied at higher altitudes (over 11,000 feet) than I had before. It was great. The clear skies and bright sun were wonderful (but dangerous for sunburn). The slopes were very varied. David Abraham and I skied hard and long on everything but Buttermilk which is mainly for beginners. There are good tough runs on the other three mountains: Highlands, Snowmass and Ajax, in increasing order.

The toughest runs are probably as steep as those at Vail, but not as long.

At night, Aspen provides an amazing number of fine restaurants for what is actually a small town. I will not catalog them here, but they range from the pool hall (in the basement under the Aspen Steak Company) for inexpensive but large sandwiches and pizzas and the Village Pantry for marvelous inexpensive blueberry pancakes for breakfast to Don Giovanni's for first class expensive Northern Italian cuisine and, when we were there, outstanding entertainment. An astounding young magician performing right at your table! Incidentally, forget Andre's for breakfast. Expensive and slow, and scrambled eggs are scrambled eggs!

The local "people zoo", where evening arrangements can be made, is the sundech outside the bar at the foot of the Little Nell lift at the bottom of Ajax Mountain (right in town).

Very felicitous, and marvelous variety available.

Only in Aspen is rock and roll music provided on the free town buses, (paid for by the taxpayers and the townists, ask Paddy Frucht). Because of the previous snow drought, great bargains were available in the ski stores. I saved \$75.00 on a brand new pair of K-2s. I tried to resist — but failed. All in all, Aspen is a great place; and with lots of good skiing, too!
