- Place: Jacque Hadler's cottage on Kent Island. Limited to 40 people. Reservations are now full. Call Gail Gell, coordinator, 620-4573 for cancellations or waiting list.
- Bring: Salad or dessert. Bring your own picnic if you come at 10:00. Also bring your swimming gear and extra folding chairs if you have them. Soft drinks, beer, wine, hot dogs and hamburgers with all the fixings will be provided. Jacque's catamaran will be available for sailing and the bay for swimming. How To Get There: Go east from Annapolis on Rt. 50 over the Bay Bridge. At the first traffic light after the bridge, turn south on Rt. 8 on Kent Island. The Matapeake Public Recreation Ground entrance is 3 miles south of Rt. 50 (a public boat landing if you wish to launch your own boat). At the Kentmorr Airpark entrance, 5 miles south of Rt. 50, turn right back toward the bay. Take that road to Hadler's cottage. It's the only road - you can't go wrong. It's the blue (4th) cottage after the 90° left turn.

"SKI THE FRENCH ALPS"

Preliminary Announcement

Bob and Margaret Wyckoff advise all to keep January 25 through February 9 open for another great ski adventure. Tentative plans are to fly to Geneva via Air France and then take our own bus for one week each at La Plagne and Val Thorens. La Plagne consists of 4 modern "ski villages" high in the mountains and 3 old French villages in the valleys, all interconnected with 65 lifts and a 6,000 foot vertical drop. Val Thorens, along with Les Menuires, Meribel, and Courcheval, offers 135 lifts and 300 km of marked trails (we skied there before and loved it). Both areas have summertime glacier skiing so we're guaranteed good snow. Tentative price is \$995 including breakfasts and dinners in 3-star hotels. More details next month.

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ESA CONVENTION REPORT By Geoff' Wadey

PVS delegates to the ESA convention last month were Dot Mason, Eloise Newdorp, Art Topping, and Geoff' Wadey. Our President, Marilyn Clark, also appeared as a volunteer on the registration desk and Bill Anderson operated an hospitality suite for sundry friends of skiing. Bing Poon and others also attended.

The technical sessions on Saturday on the Qualified Amateur Ski Instruction program; proficiency testing, Nordic, Alpine and citizen racing, and other subjects were informative and interesting. The most critical session was the general session on Sunday at which the dues-increase by-laws changes were debated. The discussion was neither as long nor as bitter as I had expected although there were sharp differences between the delegates positions. Attempts to reduce the 100% club discount and to increase the dues were defeated, but not entirely for selfish financial reasons.

Several persons expressed the belief that the time has come for ESA to change from an organization devoted to the interests of a small minority of skiers, such as racers or 100% club members, to an organization that fights for all skiers, whether members of ESA clubs or not. In my own speech, I suggested that in order to survive, we must live within our income, however painful that may be at the moment; must increase our income by increasing membership (and take no immediate action, such as increasing dues, that will decrease membership); and must serve all skiers by becoming the Sierra Club for skiers--becoming known as the organization that fights for skiers in these difficult times. I suggested a reduced-fee one-year introductory membership to increase membership and a slightly-reduced fee multiple-year membership to raise immediate cash. Others suggested that the time of 100% clubs with reduced dues is past, that dues should be uniform, and that the appeal be to skiers in general, regardless of club affiliation.

The net effect was that ESA starts off on a new basis with clear expression from the convention that we must get our finances in order and that we must change rapidly from a small organization appealing to a

minority of skiers to a much larger organization which can represent and fight for the majority of skiers. Furthermore, the reaction of the delegates expressed optimism that this can be done.

NATIONAL SKI PATROL CHARTER By Geoff' Wadey

The outpouring of letters in support of the National Charter for the National Ski Patrol is effective. Senator Mathias, a key member of the Judiciary Committee has now agreed to be a co-sponsor. Thank-you letters to him would be appropriate and of further help to the bill.

The present situation is that Senator Kennedy, chairman of the Judiciary Committee wants to review the present guidelines for the granting of National Charters, which were drawn up in 1969 after President Johnson vetoed a national-charter bill. Senator Kennedy wants to be sure that passing the charter bill for the National Ski Patrol will not lead to a flood of requests for charters. The Judiciary Committee staff is now preparing a draft of a more stringent (but not too stringent) set of guidelines.

More letters are needed and will help. If you have not yet written, write now to Senators and your Representatives in Congress. Cite Senate Bill S. 43 and mail to "Honorable Senator _____, U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510. Senators whom you might write are:

PVS PROFILE

Dick King

Last March my family and I went to Vail for a week of skiing. When we arrived at Stapleton airport, Julie and Dick King met us and helped us to our charter bus. They had just bought a new house and were biding their time at the Lucky - U - Motel. Vail is truly one of the world's best ski areas and, while recuperating each evening, I would reminisce about my association with Dick King, as Keith Lyon had asked me to write a biography of him.

Some of you have known Dick longer than I, but probably not as well. We first became acquainted, like other PVSers, at Arnolds Hofbrau Restaurant on Pennsylvania Ave. while attending pre-charter flight meetings for our European Ski Trip in 1963 to St. Anton, Davos and Chamonix.

In 1964, several of us who had been on the 1963 flight joined the NSPS and met many others who would help form the nucleus of PVS. Dick, Bruce Harstad and I rented a motel room at the Old Bedford Hotel for the entire season while we patrolled at Blue Knob. Hank Thomas was also very much in evidence those days. Dick didn't only ski with the patrol but also skied Kitzbuehel that year.

1965 saw PVS becoming an organized club and holding its first formal meeting on November 16. I remember very well spending several Friday and Saturday evenings with Dick walking through all of Georgetown and some of downtown Washington inquiring about meeting places.

In the summer of 1966 PVS went water skiing at Lewes, Delaware with Charlie Gordon, Brooke Armat and myself supplying the boats and Dick learned to slalom ski. Early October we all bid farewell to Dick as he left for his first sojourn in Saigon.

In May of 1968 Dick returned via Cervinia, Italy for a little spring skiing and went back to skiing and patrolling - his great loves. In October Dick visited us in Zurich, Switzerland while enroute home from Bangkok, Thailand.

In 1970, while at the Pentagon, Dick met Julie who was to become his greatest love. It all becomes very confusing, but I believe the scenario goes like this. Dick returned to Saigon in 1972 and remet Julie - love bloomed - Julie's tour was up - she returned to the U.S. - Dick followed - they married here - both returned to Saigon and have been happy ever since.

The story should end here as most of you are up to date with the Kings since their return from Saigon in June 1973. Dick introduced Julie to skiing in January 1974 by taking her to the USSA ski week at Sun Valley, Idaho. It was a great experience, a great revelation, and a great new sharing. In August 1974 they moved from Virginia when they bought a house in Bethesda. Dick never said why he left Virginia, but I'm certain it was so they could be closer to the Stechers.

Now that Dick has retired from government and has started a second career with Martin-Marietta in Denver, he and Julie are planning a new life which will include more camping in the summer and certainly more and better skiing in the winter. Dick and Julie met us again when we were departing from Denver and although we knew that it wouldn't be too long before we would meet again, there were four pairs of glistening eyes.

So although we must occasionally say good-bye to friends, remember that we are only seperated by distance and time from some but unfortunately by an eternity from others.

RECIPES

#1. Marinated Mushrooms by Trudy Santoro

- In saucepan bring to a boil:
- 1/3 cup red wine vinegar
- 1/3 cup salad oil
- 1 small onion, thinly sliced and ringed
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. parsley flakes
- 1 tsp. prepared mustard
- 1 Tablespoon brown sugar

Add 2 6 oz. cans mushrooms, drained.

Simmer 5 minutes. Pour into bowl and cover. Chill overnight, stirring occasionally. Drain. Serve.

#2 Tahitian Chicken Salad by Judy Mealey

Mix together 1½ cups mayonnaise, 1 cup raisins (plumped in white wine for several hours), 1 cup salted peanuts, 1 cup mango chutney, cut into slivers, and 1 cup flaked coconut. Toss with 2 pounds cooked chicken meat, diced coarsely. Gently combine two cups of diagonally sliced ripe bananas. Season with salt and pepper. Mound the salad on a big bed of salad greens and garnish with slices of avocado and banana, which you have dipped into lemon juice. For 12.

#3 Black Forest Cake by Janet Marx

1 chocolate cake mix baked in two layers.

Put 1 can cherry pie filling in sauce pan. Blend in ¼ cup sugar, 2 tablespoons corn starch, dash of salt. Cook over medium low heat, stirring often, until thick and clearish. Reduce heat and cook a little longer. Stir in 1 tsp. rum extract and cool thoroughly in refrigerator.

With electric mixer beat until smooth 1 cup soft margarine, 4½ cups powdered sugar (1 box) and 2 envelopes pre-melted unsweetened chocolate (see package directions) warmed in water. Add 3 egg yolks, one at a time and beat well after each until light and fluffy.

Put one cake layer on plate, flat side up and put about ½ cup of the butter cream in center. Put a border of butter cream, the same height as the center, around the edge. Fill in with the cherry filling.

Put the next layer of cake, flat side down, on and press lightly. Frost with the remaining butter cream. Garnish with sweet or unsweetened chocolate shavings. Keep in refrigerator and serve at room temperature.

#4 Fried Asparagus & Artichoke Hearts
By Angela Kuff

Use fresh asparagus or fresh artichoke hearts or one box of frozen. Cook accordingly. Cut asparagus into bite-size pieces and roll in flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Repeat with artichoke hearts. Beat lightly 2 eggs. (use 1 egg per 1 box of vegetables). Dip the flour-coated vegetables into the egg and fry individually in salad oil. (drop the artichoke hearts into the oil with a spoon). Drain on absorbant paper. Serve hot or at room temperature. Can be made several hours in advance.

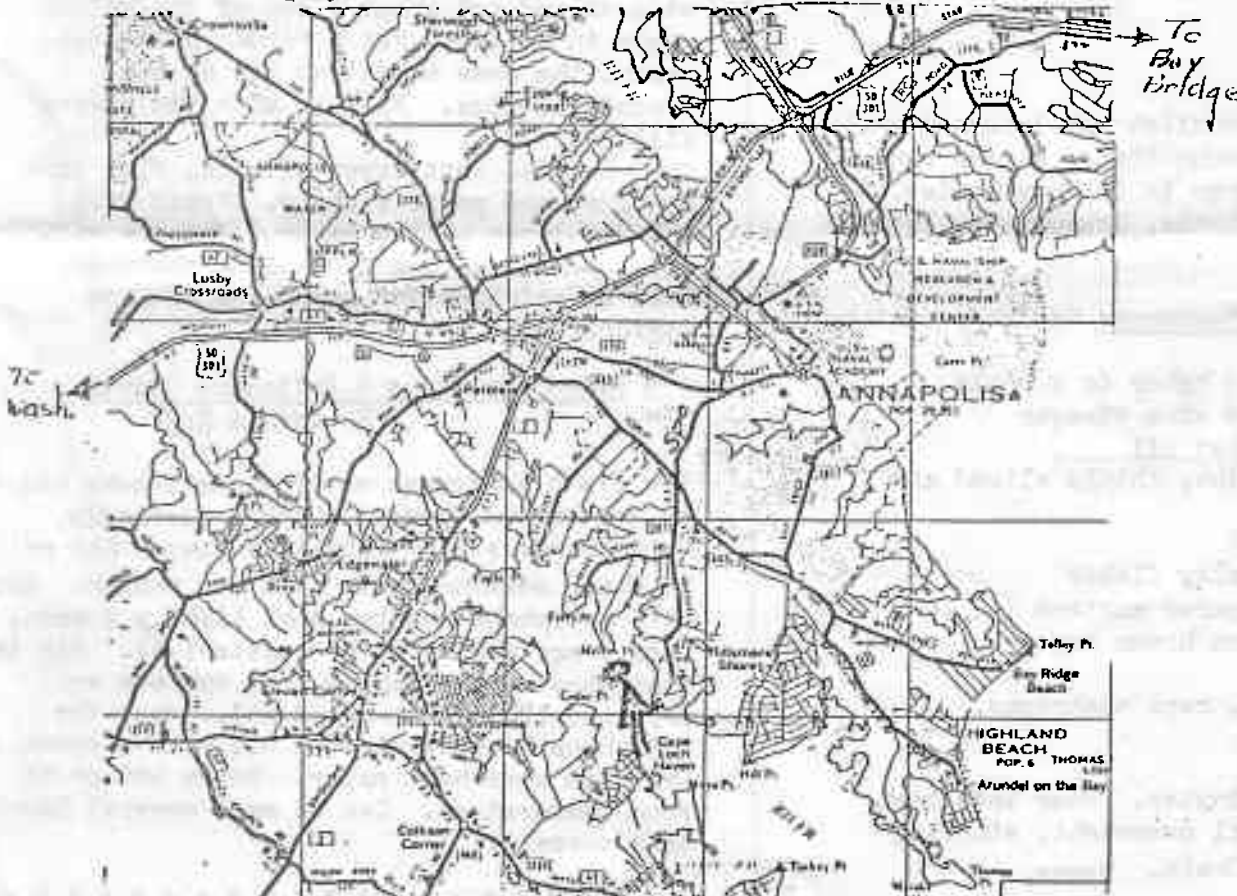
If you are boating in the Annapolis area, you may also arrive by boat. Look for the dock at Melvin Pt. (between marker 10 & 12)
