

COOK'S CORNER

For the 61 of us skiing/ eating at Mont Sutton, the Auberge La Paimpolaise chef created an absolutely

delicious appetizer in our honor. As the trip report attests, <u>all</u> the meals were outstanding. I feel very honored to be able to provide "OUR" special PVS recipe for you.

PVS SNAILS IN PUFF PASTRY

Saute in very hot skillet and set aside:

- 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine

- 60 snails

- 1 green onions, chopped

Saute:

- 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine

- 1 purple shallots

- 1 stalk: celery, finely chopped *

1 small carrot, finely chopped *

- Pinch of salt

- Dash of pepper

Add and bring to boil: - 1/2 cup white wine

Add and bring to boil:

- 1 cup heavy cream

- Bay leaf

- Pinch of thyme (1/4 teaspoon dried)

- 1/2 teaspoon crushed black pepper

Simmer mixture slowly until thickened.

Cook puff pastry shells according to package directions. Just prior to serving, mix cream sauce with snails. Allow five snails per person. Serves twelve.

* Best if put through food processor.

WILD RICE AND MUSHROOMS WITH WATER
CHESTNUTS

In large saucepan, combine; bring to boil:

- 4 cups chicken broth

- 1 large onion, chopped

Add:

- 1/2 cup wild rice, rinsed and drained Reduce heat, cover, and simmer 20 minutes.

Add:

- 1 cup uncooked brown rice

- 1 4-oz can sliced mushrooms, undrained

- 1 6-oz can sliced water chestnuts

Bring mixture back to boil. Then reduce heat, cover and simmer until liquid is absorbed, approximately 20-30 minutes. Garnish with parsley sprigs. Serves 12.

APPLE STUFFED ACORN SQUASH

Cut into half and remove seeds with grapefruit spoon:

- 4 acorn squash (about 1 pound each)

Place cut side down in shallow baking dish, and add 1/2 inch boiling water.

Bake, uncovered, at 375* for 35 minutes.

(Microwave instructions: Place cut side down on paper towel. Bake two halves at one time for 5 minutes. Repeat.)

Turn cut side up. Brush cut surfaces and cavities with:

- 3 Tablespoons butter or margarine

Sprinkle with salt and ground cinnamon.

Combine:

- 4 apples, peeled, cored, and chopped

- 1 Tablespoon grated lemon rind

- 1 Tablespoon lemon juice

- 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine

- 1/2 cup honey

Spoon mixture into squash cavities. Bake uncovered, at 350* for 30 minutes. Yield: 8 servings.

For an easy alternative to the apple filling, use canned apple sauce to fill the cavity. Sprinkle with nutmeg and cinnamon and bake as directed.



MT SUTTON, CANADA by Myra Evans

On Sunday, 8 January, 65 PVS'ers (give or take a few) left Washington National bound for Mt. Sutton, Canada. Everything went smoothly, though I did hear a few complaints about the Eagle pretzel snacks in flight—not to worry though; PVS tracked down some of the best food on the entire east coast once they arrived at La Paimpolaise hotel in Sutton. On Saturday, a group of skiers went to Bromont for the day. Some of the others stayed at Mont Sutton and Alice Swalm and Jack Hadler went to Montreal. We all had a great time on our last day in Canada. The group from Bromont even laughed at all of Jacks Peoples' jokes on the way home!

Even though the ski conditions were not perfect, the group and the accommodations could not have been better. Jack really put on a first class trip and I believe everyone had a good time. It is impossible to predict weather conditions anytime of year and the east has definitely had its share of weird weather this year.
