Approach Annapolis on Route 50. Turn off at first Annapolis exit (also labelled "Parole"). Stay right--road loops back under highway and becomes Route 178, General's Highway. Stay on it for about five miles. At the seventh stop light turn right onto Herald Harbor Road (Texaco and Gulf stations at intersection). At first stop sign turn left (still Herald Harbor Road). Follow winding street past Herald Harbor Mini-Mart and Fire Station, make no unnecessary turns. A sign indicates when it becomes Long Point Road; continue for ½-mile to 256, on your left.

in every state and country that has a mountain. It MOST certainly describes the marvelous dinner that is sponsored annually by the Copes. This year marked the 18th Annual dinner.

The appetizer course started the evening with:

Shrimp Mold Artichoke Squares Chicken Bites with Sauces Blueberry Punch

The fish/salad course consisted of:

Asparagus-Scallop Timbales Ranch Pea Salad Saffron-Champagne Sauce Blanc de Blanc Chardonnay Dry Creek

# ASPARAGUS-SCALLOP TIMBALES

#### Blend together: .

- 1/3 1/2 pound blanched bay scallops
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1 beaten egg

Pour mixture into  $5-6\ 1/2\ \text{cup}$  timbale cups.

Cook according to package directions:

- 1 10-oz. package frozen asparagus

#### Blend together:

- Cooked asparagus
- 1 Tablespoon cream
- 1 beaten egg

Pour over scallop mixture in timbale cups. Place cups in a pan of boiling water (deep enough to cover 1/2 of mold.) Bake 30-40 minutes at  $350^{\circ}$  until "set". Check for doneness as you would a custard. Cool and unmold.

Serve with a sauce. The recipe is provided for the Champagne Sauce served with the dinner. Pat says other sauces would be good, too. Try one with dill in sour cream for variety.

# SAFFRON-CHAMPAGNE SAUCE

Simmer for about 15 minutes:

- 1/4 cup champagne
- Large pinch of saffron threads

Strain. Add to:

- 1 cup Hellman's (or equivalent) mayonnaise Refrigerate. Makes approximately 1 cup sauce.

Rack of Lamb with Garlic Sauce Green Bean Bundles Tomatoes Stuffed with White Bean Puree

Assorted Breads

Cotes de Rhone Chateauneuf du Pape

# TOMATOES STUFFED WITH WHITE BEAN SAUCE

Rinse and cover with hot water to cover by 4 inches:

- 3 cups dried white beans

Boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Let sit for 1 hour. Drain. Cover with cold water to cover by 4 inches. Bring back to boil and simmer until tender, approximately 40 minutes. Drain. Reserve liquid.

Place into basket of food processor:

- Cooked, drained beans
- 1 1/2 cups fresh parsley sprigs
- 4-5 cloves garlic, minced
- 4 Tablespoons "good" olive oil

Salt and pepper to taste

With the motor running, add bean liquid to make the mixture the consistency of mashed potatoes.

Halve and scoop the centers from:

- 12 small tomatoes

Turn upside down on paper towels to drain for 10 minutes or more. Pipe bean filling into tomatoes. Heat in 350° oven for 20 - 30 minutes or until heated throughout.

Serves 12.

("Good" olive oil is "Virgin" or "Extra Virgin" olive oil This describes the manner of processing.)

#### POTOMAC VALLEY SKI CLUB-SUTTON TRIP

SAME TIME January 8-15, 1989 Sunday to Sunday SAME PLACE Mont Sutton, Quebec SAME STATION Airplane

Reservations are firm at the slopeside LaPaimpolaise for the now fourth annual spectacularly successful Mont Sutton ski trip. The unknown factor at this time is the air carrier because I am still shopping for the lowest price that will provide us with the best and most convenient service.

The trip will include ALL TRANSPORTATION (AIR, BUS TRANSFER AND VAN RENTALS FOR USE IN SUTTON), SEVEN NIGHTS LODGING, SEVEN BREAKFASTS AND DINNERS (WITH WINE) AND A SIX-DAY LIFT TICKET PLUS CONSTANT OPEN HOUSE HOSPITALITY in the trip leaders suite (same as previous years). There will be an extra charge for the sleigh ride for those who want to go on it. The cost for this all inclusive ski week is \$595 per person. If we find that we can get a lower rate on the plane or the U.S./Canadian exchange rate fluctuates to our advantage, we will reimburse accordingly. It is necessary to ask for a deposit of \$100 per person to be sent to Jack Peoples by July 25. A second payment of \$200 will be due by September) 25, with the final payment of \$285 due by November 25, (you have already made a \$10 deposit).

Since the trip is now oversold by about 10 people beyond the capacity of the LaPaimpolaise (55), I need to know immediately if any of you have changed your mind about going on the trip. (Your \$10 goodwill deposit will be refunded). For the waitlisted people, we will be able to make alternative housing arrangements at the Burns Chalet (you can eat with the group at the LaPaimpolaise). It is very important that we work this out early, so please, those of you on the present waitlist, indicate your willingness to accept other housing on the form below. We are also restricted on the number of seats available on the airplane at group prices.

For those of you who are new to the trip or are not familiar with Mont Sutton, here are some of the statistics on the mountain. Sutton has nine chairlifts (no lines during the week), 3000 feet elevation, 1550 feet vertical, 54 trails (some have been added but the trails have been renumbered to adequately describe the scope of the mountain), long runs and glade skiing (skiing through the trees) and four restaurants on the mountain for coffee breaks and lunch. Plans for this year include replacing the #4 double chair with a regular quad chair, increased snow making and more trails cut off of the new (1988) quad chair #7). By the way, chairlift #1 is at the side door of the LaPaimpolaise so you can put your ski boots on in your room. The lift ticket is good at all four mountains in SKI EAST--Sutton, Bromont, Orford and Owl's Head, and we plan to have the rental vans available for trips to the other mountains if it is desired.
