

DIRECTIONS TO THE BARRYS' HOUSE at 2535 Ogden St. Falls Church, Va. From the Capitol Beltway.(I-495) take the exit marked "Rt 7 Falls Church." (Do NOT take the one marked Rt 7, Tysons Corner.) Follow Rt 7 to the 5th stoplight and turn right on Shreve Road. A Roy Rogers and a Long-John Silver restaurant are on opposite sides of the intersect. Follow Shreve Road approximately one mile to Ogden street. Turn right on Ogden (the street sign is on the opposite side of Shreve Rd) and proceed to the Barry home which is the next to the last house on the right hand side.

Alternatively, take Lee Highway (Rt 29/211) from Rosalyn through the

center of Falls Church some 2 miles to Shreve Rd.(Rt 703). Turn right. (A 9-hole golf course is at the intersect.) Follow Shreve Rd. a little more than a mile to Ogden street where turn left and proceed to the Barry house (next to the last on the right hand side.) .

HIKE IN SHENADOAH NATIONAL PARK

A circuit hike(climb) through Cedar Run and Whiteoak Canyons - two of the deepest and steepest ravines of the Park with a stotal descent and ascent of 4000 feet. The emphasis is on spectacular scenery, waterfalls, cascades, swimming holes, cliffs and wild terrain. The hike goes down Cedar Run Canyon, a little frequented section of the Park, and comes back by way of the more popular Whiteoak Canyon.

It covers 7 miles, is rated strenuous, and offers a most exhilerating adventure to the stout hearted.

Sturdy shoes, extra socks (there will be some streams to ford) lots of gorp, water and lunch. (And perhaps liquid spirits left on ice in your car for celebration at trail's end.

a.m. Meet at the Cooper School just inside the Beltway at Exit 13, Rte 193, Georgetown Pike. The school is on the right of #193 on Balls Hill Rd. Carpooling will be arranged here.

An early departure is desirable to allow for the 90 mile drive and an unpressured climb. Please be on time!

UTAH

Norman Engleman's trip to Ski Utah Powder in 1984 is set for February 11-25, 1984. The group will be staying at the Salt Palace Traveloage in the heart of Salt Lake City with its refurbished heated outdoor pool, sauna, hot tub and redecorated rooms.

There will be a car for each four skiers to enable free choice of the many great ski areas including: Alta, Snowbird, Deer Valley, Park City, Snow Basin, Solitude, Brighton, Park City West, Powder Hill, etc.

Also included will be roundtrip air transportation, transfers, ten days of lift tickets plus parties before, during and after the trip.

The price is still being negotiated but is estimated to be approximately \$950.00.

SWITZERLAND

Gorman Young has obtained sanction from PVS to lead a 2-week ski trip to Switzerland, January 20 - February 4, 1984.

The first week will be at Zermatt (the small village in the shadow of the Matterhorn), a world-renowned summer and winter resort area also known for its great apres ski activities. One can ski over a pass to Cervinia, Italy and return by lifts making a grand tour. Highest skiable mountain: 11,478 ft, vertical drop, 6,178 feet.

The second week will be in Verbier in the French-speaking Valais region outstanding for its vast snowfields and huge snow bowls - some very challenging. One can ski in three valleys on the same lift pass. Also has a very modern and excellent lift system connecting all areas by gondolas, telepheriques and chairs. Offers endless variety. Highest skiable mountain:9,069'; vertical drop, 4,569 feet.

All land and air arrangements will be made by Swissair with direct flight from New York to Geneva and return - 14 nights in Europe - 12 days of skiing - 1st class hotels. Prices are not yet firm but will be by mid-May. Expect the package to come in at about \$1500 per person, double occupancy.

Gorman is limiting the number of people to approximately 20 and will accept \$35 reservation fees now. Complete details and prices will appear in the June TOOT or call Gorman at 202-244-2319.

The Blue Ridge Ski Council, of which we are members, individually and as a club, held its Spring meeting in April. Bob and Marylee Grasley, Geoff' Wadey, and Bob Wyckoff attended for PVS. A new Vice-President, Bill Levin of the Arlington Hall Ski Club, was elected; the other officers continue in office. BRSC Flight Sanction was voted for three PVS trips --- Austria in January, Utah in February, and the trip to Greece this coming September. The poor snow conditions hampered the Amateur Ski Instrucion activities in the East this Winter; there was only one applicant at Roundtop in January.
