FUN RUN!!! RUN - FUN???? The annual Fun Run/Walk around Accotink Lake is held the first week-end in May. It begins at

Accotink Lake and ends at the home of Marilyn and Dick Clark and is indeed always FUN!!! It is debatable if the "run" part is the "fun" part. Many consider the "food" part to be the "fun" part. At any rate, whether the participant is a runner/gasper or a walker/talker, the delicious brunch provided by Marilyn is an incentive to all to complete the course. Those who have participated can attest to the delicious recipes that Marilyn uses. The first is a standard that Marilyn serves annually -

CHEDDAR-EGG BAKE

In 8" X 8" buttered casserole dish, alternate layers of:

- -8 slices buttered bread with crusts removed
- -1/2 pound grated cheddar cheese

Beat together:

- -3 or 4 eggs
- -1 cup milk
- -1 teaspoon mustard
- -Pepper to taste

Pour egg mixture over bread and cheese. Chill at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight so that bread can absorb all liquid.

Bake at 350° for 35 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

Recipe can be increased for larger crowd. For 9" X 13" casserole dish, increase recipe by one-third.

For variation, add cooked crumbled sausage or bacon between layers with a bit more on top.

The Cheese-Egg Bake is served with a Marilyn Clark original -

SAUSAGE BAKE

Break into pieces, partially cook, and drain:

-l pound bulk sausage

To drained sausage, add:

-Half of an 8-oz. package of Pepperidge Farm Stuffing Mix

Place mixture in casserole dish, bake at 350° for 30 minutes. Serves 8 to 10.

To the delicious recipes above, Marilyn adds a bowl of fresh fruit, a selection of homemade breads, (i.e., cranberry-nut bread, banana-nut bread, walnut, and pumpkin bread), and your choice of wine, beer, coffee, or soda. She makes the Walnut Bread each year and others depend on what is in the freezer.

WALNUT BREAD

In large bowl, mix together with fork:

- -3 cups flour
- -1 1/2 cups coarsley chopped walnuts
- -5 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- -1 1/4 cups sugar

In small bowl, mix together:

- -3 eggs, slightly beaten
- -1 1/2 cups milk
- -1/3 cup salad oil

Stir egg mixture into flour mixture just until flour is well moistened. Pour mixture into greased 9" X 5" loaf pan. (Marilyn uses two smaller pans, approximately 7" X 3".) Bake one hour and twenty minutes for large loaf pan. (Small pans - bake for about one hour and ten minutes.) Oven temperature is 350°.

Cool at least ten minutes. Remove from pan. Freezes nicely.

TTP!! Sausage cooks quickly and drains well in a microwave oven. Break into pieces, cook on high for 3 minutes. Drain. Break into pieces with fork. Cook 2 minutes more to fully cook. Drain.
