

OCTOBER MONTHLY MEETING by Sara Huggins

The regular third Tuesday monthly meeting was held at the lovely home of Charlotte Eddy in Fairfax, Va., with approximately 50 in attendance. After socializing and partaking of wines, apple cider, soft drinks, a tableful of cheeses/crackers, chili con queso, chips/dips, etc., Pres. Gail called the meeting to order. Gail thanked Bob and Mary Lee Grasley for setting up the Blue Ridge Ski Council meeting at the Holiday Inn Crowne Plaza in Rockville. Reports and up-dates were also given on coming activities, meetings and trips.

Brian Eardley of the Ski Center in Washington showed and discussed the newest in ski equipment. Three skis from France were shown: Dynamic VR 20 (fibro metal - wet process), good for ice. Dynastar (Dynasty Elastol elite) (\$330.00), and LaCroix (fibre carbon, handmade in former olympian Léo LaCroix's small factory), very flexible (\$330.00, entrylevel, \$435.00 & \$550.00). A demo pair will be available at the ski center (Bob Grasley has a pair). Brian also brought a Pre-(Brecision) -1200 made in Sun Valley. Also mentioned were Super Guy Slalom (Super G), originally designed for World Cup Super G event, turns easily. For general purpose, East-West skiing, giant slalom skis were recommended (Atomic, Rossingnol). Nothing new to report on bindings now, but an electronic binding is in the works. Boots previewed were: Lange - thermofit (electronic heat-fitting) (\$275.00), Nordica, also Soloman - rear-entry boots with a dial cable system, front and back, to control the fit (\$235.00), Koflach - a junior racing boot with cant adjustments (\$165.00), Dachstein - conventional boot with canting, also with foaming - a chemical compound squirted into the boot to make it form around the foot (\$240.00, without foam, approx. \$300.00 additional for foam). A new canting device was also shown. Also discussed were orthotics for boots (\$78.00) (Bob Grasley has some). Orthotics are also available for running and tennis shoes. Also, Gore-Tex fabrics for blocking snow, sleet, rain and wind and keeping you warm and dry, while the fabric also breathes so perspiration can escape.

Brian also told us of a future new ski area (1,000 vertical), perhaps two years off, in Maryland, near Liberty. There will be a Ski Show at the Washington Sheraton, November 11-13.

PAST EVENTS

BLUE RIDGE SKI COUNCIL by Geoff' Wadey

PVS was the host for the Fall Meeting of the Blue Ridge Ski Council. Bob and Marylee Grasley made the arrangements for the meeting at the new Holiday Inn in Rockville. Our other official representatives were our president, Gail Pease, Bob Wycoff, and Geoff' Wadey. Marylyn Clark handled the reception deak. Trip sanctions were granted to four more club trips: PVS's to Switzerland; Air Force Headquarters' to Mt Tremblant, 23 November; and Columbia's to Killington (5 days) 5 February, and to Vail (6 days), 17 March.

The Ski Patrol now has eight patrols in our area with 230 people involved. However, they always need more patrollers and would appreciate our help in recruiting them. They now present slide programs on request on hypothermia, clothing, using lifts, and the skier's safety code and have an excellent safety movie, "Skier's Choice". This year's BRSC Ski Safety Award was presented to Den Drumwright of SCWDC for his years of work on safety education and binding release checking.

Ski-O-Ree (BRSC's big event) will be at Canaan Valley, 3-5 February. Perhaps we should participate in this as a fun social we-kend for partying, meeting skiers from other clubs, and skiing. Camaan Valley has expanded its area with a new trail and snow making. WISP has added 20 feet to its vertical with bulldozers and new trails on the back side.

The big item at the meeting was a pair of presentations by the now-competing organizations, the United States Ski Association, with whom we are associated through the Blue Ridge Ski Council, and the United States Recreational Ski Association (of Southern California). Both claim to foster both racing and recreational skiing and each would like your twenty Collars.
