COOK'S CORNER

November is the beginning of winter - a time to complete those things we began in the summer and fall. This month's recipes

bring those I've been keeping in my pocket from the summer and fall events - International Dinner, Excom, and Chili Cookoff.

From the International Dinner in May:

OYSTER ROLL Dorothy Mills

Blend together:

- 1 (8 oz) package cream cheese
- 1 Tablespoon mayonnaise
- 1/4 teaspoon onion salt
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- Dash pepper

Between two sheets of waxed paper, roll the cream cheese mixture flat into a base of approximately 8 X 12. (May be a bit smaller.) Remove top waxed paper.

Along length of cream cheese base, spread evenly:

- 1 can smoked oysters

Roll as for jelly roll. (Use the waxed paper and a spatula to roll the cream cheese mixture.) Refrigerate until firm. Slice into 1/4 inch slices. Serve on crackers or party rye.

# QUICK PARTY DIP FOR VEGIES Lu Beale/Nancy Garrett

Mix together, and chill:

- 1 (8 oz) container plain yogurt
- 1/2 cup low calorie mayonnaise
- 1-2 Tablespoons horseradish
- 2-3 teaspoons Worchestershire sauce
- Few drops tabasco
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- Few drops lemon juice

From the July Excom at the Felkers:

SHRIMP MOLD Karen Felker

Heat and stir until boiling:
- 1 can tomato soup (undiluted)

Add and continue stirring until well blended:

- 1 package Knox Gelatin
- 1 (8 oz) package cream cheese
- 1 cup mayonnaise

Remove from heat and add:

- 2 (6 oz) packages small frozen shrimp
- 2-3 Tablespoons diced celery
- 2-3 Tablespoons diced onion

Mix well. Pour into 5 cup lightly greased mold. Chill for several hours until firm. Unmold on lettuce leaf.

For those who constantly count calories (doesn't everyone?), use Philadelphia Light Cream Cheese and low calory mayonnaise (I prefer Hellmans.)

Serve with crackers.

From the Chili Cookoff at the Evans':

#### BLUEBERRY TORTE PIE Marilyn Clark

Blend together with mixer:

- 1 (8 oz) package cream cheese
- 1 cup powdered sugar

Beat as directed, not too stiff:

- 1 package Dream Whip

Add to cream cheese mixture.


In 9-inch torte pan, make graham cracker crust. Cover crust with one half of cream cheese mixture.

Top cream cheese layer with:
- 1 can blueberry pie filling

Top with remaining cream cheese mixture. Sprinkle with cinnamon . Chill several hours.


