

### FALL FOLIAGE HIKE WITH DINNER AT THE MASONS! -

When: Saturday, October 26. Rain date: Sunday, October 27.

What: We will hike another newly laid out section of the Appalachian Trail between Mt. Weather, junction of routes 601 and 605, and Route 7. Long hike covering the entire distance will be 10 - 11, possibly 12 miles - up and down, passing Bears' Den, once an inn, and a magnificent view from ledges just one mile from the beer. Short hikers will start at Route 7, pass the same ledges and Bears' Den, and go as far as they want, returning by the same trail. Then - ten miles to the Masons' where dinner will be ready...almost.

Time: 8 A.M. at the Cooper School just inside the Beltway at Exit 13, Rte 193 (Georgetown Pike). The school is on the right side of #193 (going towards town) on Balls Hill Rd. Carpooling will be arranged here.

Bring: Lunch, including beverage and spare drinking water, warm clothing in case it gets cold after dark, and rain gear as good weather insurance. Wear sturdy shoes.
