OKTOBERFEST #
The introduction alone is sufficient to make the mouth water in anticipation of good things to eat!

On October 1, the annual Oktoberfest celebration will be held at the home of Margaret and Bob Wyckoff. Margaret has provided recipes for the "best" to go with the "wurst". Among the best are Margaret's recipes for <u>SAUERKRAUT</u> and <u>PFLAUMEN KUCHEN</u>, otherwise known as German Plum Cake.

SAUERKRAUT

In large pot, simmer the following ingredients for one hour:

- 2 lbs. sauerkraut, drained and rinsed
- 5 ounces lard
- 1 large sauer Apple diced
- 1 large onion diced
- 3 to 4 Tablespoons brown sugar

Stir every ten minutes or so, until flavors are well blended. Serves 12.

PFLAUMEN KUCHEN

Into large bowl, sift together:

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder

To dry ingredients, add the following:

- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 5 drops lemon extract
- 2 eggs

Mix to form dough. Roll out to fit on greased 10" X 15" cookie sheet.

Wash, pit, quarter and spread over dough:

- 2 lbs. Italian Plums

CRUMB TOPPING:

Sift together:

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 cups flour

Add:

- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract - 1/2 lb. soft unsalted butter or margarine

Work with fingers to mix until dough crumbles and resembles green pea size. Scatter over plums.

Bake 350* for 20 minutes. Increase temperature to 450* for 20 more minutes or until crumbs are nicely browned.

EASY REUBEN

In medium skillet, (9" diameter), over medium heat, stir for 10-15 minutes:

- 1 12-oz. can corned beef
- 1 8-oz. can sauerkraut

When mixture begins to steam, place strips of swiss cheese on top. Cover for approximately 5 minutejuntil cheese melts.

Serve atop dark pumpernickel rye with spicy mustard and/or horseradish mayonnaise. Serves 3-4 hungry people.
