



POTOMAC VALLEY SKI CLUB AND THE SKI DOCS

SAME TIME SAME PLACE SAME STATION (Union Station DC)

Repeating an old-fashioned (but up-to-modern standards) ski train for one week to Mont Sutton, located atop the town of Sutton in the province of Quebec, Canada, just 60 miles S.E. of Montreal and 10 miles over the Vermont border.

Mont Sutton, the most successful ski mountain in Quebec's Eastern Township, brings the sought after flavor of the French Alps without flying 3,000 miles across the ocean. Mont Sutton is a high mountain, higher than Mont Tremblant. There are few areas with the amount of "sous-bois" (glade skiing) that Sutton boasts. The terrain is natural with lots of trees and the runs are very interesting. A new double chair will serve the upper part of the mountain and will open up three new trails for intermediate and expert skiers. The detachable quad chair, new last year, proved to be an overwhelming success. More snowmaking will be installed at the top of the mountain, on Miracle trail and on trails from Chair \$1. Improvements on Miracle will afford better access for less advanced skiers.

PACKAGE INCLUDES: All This for only \$420.00.

TRANSPORTATION: Round-trip fare (reclining coach chair) from Union Station. Washington, D.C. to St. Albans, Vermont. Roundtrip bus from St. Albans to Sutton, Quebec. Amtrak train "The Montrealer" leaves Saturday night at 6:30 P.M. arriving about 8 A.M. ir St. Albans and returns the following Friday night from St. Albans at 9 P.M. arriving ir D.C. on Saturday about 10 A.M. For additional cost, you can up-grade your seats to sleeping accommodations as follows: Roomette, \$69 one way, \$138 RT; single slumber, \$31 one way, \$62 RT; Double bedroom, \$115 one way, \$230 RT; double slumber, \$51 one way, \$102 RT. A roomette and a double bedroom are considered first class and meals (dinner, snack and breakfast) are included in the above prices.

LODGING AND MEALS: Five nights lodging at Sutton's slopeside LaPaimpolaise chateaumotel with breakfast and dinner for six days (carafe of wine with every dinner, French cooking). Kirk Burns Chalet also available for rent. Call Jack for details.

LIFT TICKETS AND MOUNTAINS: Five-day lift ticket is good at all four mountains in SKI EAST--Sutton, Bromont, Orford and Owl's Head. The group will have limited transportation available to go to the other mountains. After arrival and breakfast on Sunday, skiers may want to loosen up with a half day lift ticket or an afternoon of cross country skiing or nearby excellent tracked trails. Sutton has seven lifts (no lines during week), 3000 feet elevation, 1,550 feet vertical, 34 trails, beginners to true expert and long runs. Chairlift #1 is at the side door of the lodge so you can put your ski boots on in your room. An outstanding ski school program is available--20 hour, 5 day for \$74 (Canadian).

<u>PAYMENT:</u> For LaPaimpolaise, etc. \$100 deposit per person is due with your reservation (by September 25) and final payment is due by December 10. Cancellation 60 days prior to reserved date will be necessary to obtain deposit refund, less \$25 per room for handling charges.
