

COOK'S CORNER

SEPTEMBER!!! School starts. Ski Club reconvenes. Oysters are available. Time to talk skiing and eating!!!

The June "Cook's Corner" brought you recipes from Pat and Don Cope served at the International Dinner. The appetizers and the desserts served at the dinner are creations of those who brought them. This recipe for <u>ARTICHOKE SQUARES</u>, an outstanding appetizer, was provided by Marty McNeill, and enjoyed by all who tasted it.

ARTICHOKE SQUARES

Drain, chop, and set aside:
- 2 6-oz jars marinated artichoke hearts

Saute together until limp:

- 1 Tablespoon butter

- 1 small onion, finely chopped

- 1 clove garlic, minced

Beat with fork until light:

- 4 eggs

Stir into egg mixture:

- 2 cups grated cheddar cheese

- 2 teaspoons minced fresh parsley

- 1/8 teaspoon each pepper, oregano, and Tabasco
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs

Add:

- Chopped artichokes
- Onion mixtures

Place mixture into 7" X 11" baking dish. Bake at 325* for 30 minutes or until set. Let cool. Cut into squares.

A light, refreshing, delicious dessert, RASPBERRY-TOPPED LEMON PIE, was served by Gail Pease, and is shared with us.

RASPBERRY-TOPPED LEMON PIE

Preheat oven to 350*.

In small saucepan, cook and stir until the following ingredients thicken and the mixture is clear:

 1 10-oz package frozen red raspberries in syrup, thawed. (2 packages make a fuller pie, but are not necessary.)

- I Tablespoon cornstarch

In medium bowl, beat until light:
 3 egg yolks

Add:

 I 14-oz can sweetened condensed milk (NOT evaporated milk)

 1/2 cup lemon juice from concentrate (Gail uses Realemon)

 1-2 drops red food coloring (if desired)

Pour milk mixture into:

- 1 6-oz packaged graham cracker crumb pie crust

Bake for 8 minutes.

Spoon raspberry mixture evenly over top. Chill 4 hours or until set. Top with whipped topping. Refrigerate leftovers.

From the June meeting hostessed by Aase Berling and June Kelsey, comes this delightful recipe from June Kelsey for -

CALIFORNIA SALAD

Stir together:

- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups dairy sour cream

Combine:

- 1 20-oz can pineapple tidbits (drained)
- 1 11-oz can mandarin oranges (drained)
- 1 cup seedless grapes
- 1 cup tiny marshmallows
- 3 1/2 oz. package flaked coconut

Fold sour cream mixture into fruit mixture. Chill overnight. Salad will keep nicely for several days. Serves 8.
