Jottings from a skier's notebook on two fabulous weeks in Colorado:

It was a skier's dream come true - to arrive in 100% sunshine the day after a big snowstorm - that was Crested Butte the day we arrived on February 17th. Super perfect conditions - the best of the year according to the "locals." How lucky can you get?

You stay-at-homes don't know what you missed "ski-wise" and "party-wise." It was a ball! The gung-ho early bird skiers of the week were the Evans, the Garretts and the Leonhardts - out before 9 every morning while everyone else was still at breakfast. Not surprisingly, the same group regularly appeared each afternoon in the hotel's hot tub. By the way, following Barbara Leonhardt down the mountain was an exercise in perfection - i.e. imitating perfection. Too bad Barbara had to leave at the end of the first week- rumor had it that she had to work to pay for Fred's new skis!

Among the skiing highlights of the week - in addition to super skiing - was a 3-hour guided ski tour of the Crested Butte area by Jack Eflin, an original developer of the area which is a center for wild flower study and research in the summer.

As to be expected with PVS, food was a major drawing card at the resort. Social highlight was Bill Anderson's elegant apres ski party- catered by the Grande Butte Hotel and served by the Veep himself. It was perfection! Crested Butte was tremendous!! On to Telluride where it was equally fabulous. There was plenty of snow but getting hard-packed. Then on Wednesday the snows came and came and came. The local newspapers called it the "Mother of Storms." A powder skier's dream. Telluride's a great beginner's area and a great advanced area with not much in between. But what a week! Indescribable!

Skiing highlight was "The Plunge" approached with trepidation, but not all that bad, especially if led by Huey Roberts. First timers, having overcome their fears, rewarded themselves with a special dinner. (Likewise the brave souls who conquered the total-mogul "Resurrection" at Crested Butte.)

Social highlight of the week was the chili party at Penny and Bruce Hanshaw's lovely vacation/retirement home. Arriving there, we were greeted by Penny and Bruce - and a 15 foot PVS logo trampled into the snow by snowshoes (occupied by Fred Leonhardt) in the meadow in front of the house. Beyond the meadow were magnificent evergreens and snow covered mountains. Behind the meadow was a deck with built-in hot tub and the lovely home where we dined and visited and had memorable photos of ourselves taken by Eleanor Peterson's talented daughter Kristin.

Other eating highlights - dinner at Leimgruber's Bierstube (German food and Gemutlichkeit) and Sheldon's theatre evening.

COOK'S CORNER

Wonderful desserts were served at the after trip parties from both the Sutton and Colorado trips.

GRAPE CREAM TART

Karen Felker

In food processor, combine:

- 2 1/4 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 sticks (3/4 cup) chilled butter or margarine
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Process until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. With processor running, add:

- 6 - 7 Tablespoons ice water

Process until pastry forms a ball. Divide dough in half. On lightly floured surface, roll half into an 11-inch round. Fit into a 9" X 2" fluted tart pan with removable bottom. Trim edge; refrigerate.

Roll remaining half of pastry to 1/8-inch thick round. With small, sharp knife, cut out leaf shapes; with back of knife, make veins on each leaf. Place leaves on waxed-paper lined tray. Refrigerate. Bake tart shell 5 minutes in 400° oven.

In medium bowl, whisk together:

- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 Tablespoon Cognac or Brandy

Place in tart shell:

- 2 1/2 pound red seedless grapes

Pour sour-cream mixture over grapes. Arrange pastry leaves decoratively on top. Bake 1 hour, or until pastry is golden and custard set. Cool on wire rack; refrigerate. Remove pan rim. Garnish tart with sugared grapes, if desired.

(Karen used two "Mrs. Smith" deep-dish pies.)

ANGEL PIE

Liz Triau

Beat until stiff:

- 3 egg whites

Gradually add while beating:

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon lemon juice

Spread in 10" greased and floured quiche (or pie) pan. Bake at 275° for 60 minutes. Cool.

In top of double boiler, beat until thick and lemon colored:

- 4 egg yolks

Gradually beat in:

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 4 Tablespoons lemon juice

Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until thick (5 - 8 minutes). Cool.

Spread in layers over meringue shell:

- 1/2 Container (16 oz.) Cool Whip
- Lemon filling
- Remainder of Cool Whip

Chill 12 hours before serving.

(Can use 1 cup heavy cream, whipped, in place of Cool Whip.)

PINEAPPLE CAKE

Marilyn Clark

Bake according to directions, sheet cake size:

- Duncan Hines White Cake Mix

Mix together and spread on warm cake:

- 1 package (8 oz.) Cream Cheese
- 1 small package Vanilla Pudding mix
- 1 cup milk

On top of cream cheese mixture, spread in layers:

- Medium can crushed pineapple, drained
- Small container Cool Whip
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Marilyn used "lite" cream cheese and instant pudding mix.
