This astonishing hospitality is surely our most treasured asset and one that distinguishes us from other local ski clubs which must meet in rented halls and bistros.



## When is Oktober fest?

The Munich Oktoberfest is the biggest public festival in the world and will be held this year (20 Sep - 5 Oct) for the 164<sup>th</sup> time [PVS's 19<sup>th</sup>]. Each year, the Oktoberfest is attended by around 6,000,000 visitors [PVS limit of 60], who drink around 5 million liters of beer and consume over 190,000 pairs of pork sausage [a true PVS&E event].

At the foot of the Bavaria statue, the huge Oktoberfest grounds also provide carousels [will you settle for petting a horse?], roller coasters [it's a hike down to the stream and back up] and all the spectacular fun of the fair for the enjoyment and excitement of visitors of all ages. The festivities are accompanied by a program of events, including the Grand entry of the Oktoberfest Landlords [Chile Pepper & Sassafras] and Breweries [Dick Comerford & Ray McKinley], the Costume and Riflemen's Procession [Bill Anderson & Serge Triau], and a concert involving all the brass bands [now comes Toot-a-Lu].

# COOK'S CORNER - 9 -

The main dish and dessert from the March dinner are featured for you in this month's column. While the dessert appears to have lots of steps, the taste is worth the effort. Both of these recipes are from Marilyn Clark.

## ELEGANT CHICKEN

- 3/4 lbs chicken breasts
  - 1/2 cup butter
- In heavy skillet over low heat, melt butter and brown chicken slowly. Remove chicken from skillet and add:
- 1/4 cup flour
  - 2 teaspoons seasoned salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
  - 2 Tablespoons brown sugar
  - 1/8 teaspoon pepper

Slowly stir in, cooking and stirring until mixture boils and thickens:

- 1/2 cup white wine
  - 1 cup orange juice
  - 1/2 cup chicken broth
- Remove from heat, add chicken and cool. Refrigerate until 1 hour prior to serving. Slowly reheat contents of pan to simmering. Cook covered until chicken is tender - about 30 minutes.

Add and heat for 10-15 minutes longer:

- 2 oranges, sliced
- 1 cup champagne

Serves 8.

## MAUI PINE CREAM PIE

### PINEAPPLE CREAM FILLING:

In small bowl, combine:

- 4 egg yolks, lightly beaten
- 1 Tablespoon water
- 1/3 cup firmly packed cornstarch

In saucepan, combine and cook on medium heat until mixture almost boils:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- 1 20-oz. can crushed pineapple, drained (reserve 1/3 pineapple for cream-cheese layer)

Reduce heat to low. Add egg-yolk mixture slowly, stirring as you add. Cook and stir until thickened.

Add:

- 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Remove from heat; cover surface of mixture with waxed paper. Refrigerate for 30 minutes or longer, stirring once or twice.

### CRUST:

In bowl, combine and cut into pea-size chunks.

- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 Tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup butter-flavor shortening

Add:

- 2 Tablespoons finely chopped unsalted macadamia nuts, toasted\*
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon peel

Add:

- 3-4 Tablespoons cold milk

Toss with fork until dough forms a ball. Press between hands to form 5-6-inch "pancake". Wrap in waxed paper. Refrigerate 15 minutes. Flour rolling surface and pin lightly. Roll dough into circle one-inch larger all around than upside-down 9-inch pie plate. Loosen dough carefully. Fold into quarters. Unfold and press into pie plate. Fold edge under. Flute. Prick bottom and sides thoroughly with fork (50 times) to prevent shrinkage. Bake at 350°F. for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely.

### CREAM CHEESE FILLING:

In bowl, combine and beat with fork until smooth:

- 1 8-oz. package cream cheese
- 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar

Add, mixing well:

- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/3 cup finely chopped unsalted macadamia nuts, toasted\*
- 1/3 cup reserved pineapple

Spread cream cheese filling over bottom of cooled baked pie shell. Cover with pineapple cream filling.

For topping, spread 1/2 cup whipped cream on top center of pie. Spoon remaining cream into pastry bag with large rosette tip; pipe a border around pie. Garnish with lemon peel, nuts and flowers. If not serving immediately, refrigerate. Makes 10 servings. (Each serving - 580 calories.)
