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ABOUT THE BLUE RIDGE SKI COUNCIL (BRSC) By S. Triau

The BRSC is currently made up of 15 ski clubs which represents over ten thousand (10,000) skiers from Maryland, Virginia, and Washington, DC areas. It's charter also includes the State of West Virginia, but presently there are not any clubs from WV. Each of the clubs has three delegates assigned to the BRSC (presently PVS's are Nat Seeman, Dina Taylor, and the president), and it elects a slate of officers from these representatives for two year periods (the president is Kitty Imdahl, from the Columbia Ski Club- at one time she was a member of PVS). They have general meetings twice a year in the Spring and Fall; the last meeting was April 30, 1995 at Gaithersburg and the next one is on September 24, 1995 to be hosted by the Arlington Hall Ski Club.

The BRSC has two major ski trips every year: the winter carnival which this year is at Steamboat, CO on February 3-10, 1996: and the Ski-O-Ree trip which will be at Killington, VT in January 1996 (exact dates not yet pinned down). The organization promotes all ski activity with an emphasis on safety, ski patrol activities, and contributes funding to such organizations as the National Handicapped Sports (now called Disabled Sports USA), and the Regional Ski Patrol. The BRSC is a key sponsor of the Spring Fling, which just raised \$40,000.00 (net) on April 29, 1995 for Disabled Sports USA.

I would summarize by noting the three major areas of benefits to PVS from being a member of the BRSC:

- 1. A vehicle for giving back to the skiing community via charity and general support for skiing activities.
- 2. The benefits from being part of an organization that represents over 10,000 skiers.
- 3. Networking with the other clubs, sharing common problems/solutions.

If anyone is interested in some of the history of the BRSC, there was an article published in the January 1993 Toot, written by Bill Anderson. If you have any further questions about the BRSC please bring them to the general meeting or call me.

COOK'S CORNER

As promised, the balance of the recipes used for the Spring Dinner are provided. The recipes came tested from the kitchens of the 3 planners, Genee Boykin,

Marilyn Clark and Nancy Garrett. If you have a question about the recipes, call any of us.

PECAN WILD RICE PILAF

In a medium saucepan, bring to boil:

- 4 cups chicken broth

Add:

- 1 cup wild rice, well rinsed

Bring back to a boil, reduce heat to medium-low and cook, covered for 50 minutes, or until rice is tender. DO NOT OVERCOOK. Place rice in a large bowl.

In another saucepan, bring to boil:

- 2 1/4 cups water

Add:

- 1 3/4 cups wheat pilaf
Stir well. Cover and bring back to a boil.

Reduce heat to low; simmer 15 minutes, until pilaf is tender. Remove from heat; let rest for 15 minutes and add to wild rice.

Add to wild rice mixture:

- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1 cup dried currants
- 1 bunch scallions, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup chopped Italian parsley
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh mint leaves
- Grated zest of 2 oranges
- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1 Tablespoon orange juice
- Freshly ground black pepper

Toss well and serve at room temperature.

GREEN PEPPERCORN SAUCE was made following McCormick mix directions. Serves 8.

STEAMED ASPARAGUS

One pound of asparagus will serve 4 to 6 people. There are various ways to prepare.

STEAMER: Follow directions for your particular steamer - takes 15 - 20 minutes.

STOVE TOP: Place small amount of water in bottom of large skillet. Add rinsed asparagus. Cover and cook 5 - 8 minutes until crisp tender.

MICROWAVE: Rinse asparagus generously, do not shake water off. Place in flat dish - large pieplate or oblong microwave dish. Cover with plastic wrap, folding back one corner for venting. Cook 1 minute for each 5 stalks of asparagus. After 2 minutes, rearrange stalks, and turn dish. Let stand for 2 minutes.

Sprinkle cooked asparagus with any of the following: lemon juice, butter or butter flavored PAM, sesame seeds, parmesan cheese, orange juice, chopped egg, cracked black pepper.

CHOCOLATE DELIGHT

Mix together and press in 9 X 13-inch pan:

- 1 stick margarine, softened
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Mix together and spread on flour mixture:

- 1 8 oz. package cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup confectioner's sugar
- 1 cup Cool Whip

Mix together and spread on cream cheese layer:

- 1 large or 2 small packages instant chocolate pudding mix
- 2 1/2 cups milk (Use 3 cups with large mix)

Cover chocolate layer with Cool Whip. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Can also use mint chocolate curls for topping. This is a very rich dessert. Serves 12-16 small servings.


