

Take the Beltway Exit for River Road going towards DIRECTIONS: Move left immediately and take first left onto Washington. Burdette Road (at Johnson's Nursery). Continue on Burdette to Bradley Blvd. Turn right. Go approximately 1 mile (pass light at Fernwood and Bradley Presbyterian Church) and turn left onto Valley Rd. Then take first right on Ridge Rd. 8613 Long Acre Court is at the top of the hill. If lost call 301-469-6135.



BICYCLE RIDE, Thursday, March 19 10:30 AM 15 miles Meet at Shirlington Area (Arlington) Directions: Take Shirley Highway (I-395) south from Pentagon about 1½ miles and exit at Shirlington/Glebe Rd ramp (Exit 7) and follow signs to Shirlington. Bear right at the fork to turn right on Shirlington Rd. Easiest to look for five story square office building with a big green Shirlington sign on it near top (not the first tall curved

building labeled Shirlington Gateway). There are three parking lots in the area (which is essentially only one block long). Two are usually pretty full, but the one behind the movie theaters (fronting on S. Randolph St) is largely empty. Meet in front of Metropolis Bicycles in Shirlington area (4056 South 28th St.). Leader should be drinking his cappuccino at cafe right next to bike shop. Ride will head west on Four Mile Run Trail and return on W&OD Trail with a stop at the Long Branch Nature Center. There will be lots of island music, door prizes, and more.



The conversational buzz seemed even louder than usual, as skiers returned from the European ski trip eagerly recounted their adventures (even horseracing!) while others anticipated their coming adventures at Big Sky. The handing out of luggage tags and menu choices began to make that trip seem real at last.

The brief business meeting continued the festive mood. More raves for the European trip--John Smith really knows the ropes--or somebody very important! Brief announcements of upcoming events--and it was back to the table, now graced with cherry crisp and sponge cake. Ruth, you really shouldn't have--but we're glad you did!

As the members departed for home, a July-style thunderstorm suddenly erupted. Somehow the heavens didn't know it was February. Everyone made it home safely through the rushing waters. Another extraordinary PVS event!

Trip leaders John Smith and Pat Tengle couldn't possibly have ordered better weather for the 22 participants in the Swiss trip, since we had nothing but sunshine for the entire two weeks! We spent the first week at Zermatt, site of the spectacular Matterhorn, arriving by train from Zurich. Most of us tried all three of the extensive ski areas in Zermatt, and two groups of us made the very enjoyable run from Zermatt into Italy. To do this you have to take a series of lifts up to the Klein Matterhorn, then ski over the Theodulpass, near the base of the Matterhorn, and down into Cervinia where you can have lunch or whatever before taking the cable car back up to return to Zermatt. When our group arrived in Cervinia, Dina Taylor regaled us with an electrifying rendition of "O Solo Mio," though her knowledge of the words seemed a bit shaky.

Fumiko had an interesting experience in Zermatt when she returned to a store where she had bought a watch 14 years ago. She and the salesman recognized each other after all that time, and the salesman cleaned and polished the watch free of charge!

To digress just a bit, Zermatt is still an attractive town in a magnificent setting, but it was very sad -- though not surprising -- to see how drastically it had changed since I was first there in 1954 for hiking and climbing. It has completely and forever lost the bucolic charm it had as a remote Alpine village. And of course the same kind of thing has happened/is happening not just in Alpine villages but everywhere else in the world as well. Progress is all well and good, but it comes at a tremendously high cost, and now that all colorful national and regional cultures worldwide are rapidly blending into one gray, characterless international culture, most of us of a certain age can be glad we travelled as much as we did in years past, before all these deplorable developments were in full swing.

Anyway, after our week in Zermatt we took the very scenic 7-hour Glacier Express train ride westward to St. Moritz for our second week. Glitzy St. Moritz, where elegant ladies in ermines and pearls can be seen walking little bitty dogs that look more like overgrown woolly bear caterpillars than like real dogs. More importantly, St. Moritz offers great skiing too, with one excellent area right in town and several others accessible by bus to each side of town. It was in St. Moritz that Charlotte Eddy set the trip record for the longest slide downhill after a fall -- about 300 yards, I would estimate, and it was quite a spectacle to behold! Had I been judging the event, I would have given her a 10 on both form and technique, but the performance was marred by the fact that she got pretty well banged up and couldn't ski for the rest of the trip.

After our week in St. Moritz we took another scenic train ride (there's great scenery everywhere in Switzerland!) back to Zurich, where we spent the evening before returning home the following day. Glade Flake delighted in telling me how on the train it appeared that he had lost his and Joan's tickets — when the ticket puncher asked for them, they were just nowhere to be found! Whereupon Glade (poor fellow!) was subjected to a bit of wifely reproach from Joan (probably something like "Why can't you be more careful about such things, like me?!," I would guess). Anyway, they somehow bluffed their way through, and when they arrived at the hotel, lo and behold, it was discovered that guess who had had the tickets in her possession the whole time?! Good guess!

One of the great features of this trip was the baggage handling: We were able to check in at Dulles and not have to worry about baggage until it arrived at our rooms in Zermatt. The same thing at the next stage, between the Zermatt train station and our hotel in St. Moritz; and again between the St. Moritz train station and pick-up at Dulles the next day, all with only a few little glitches -- such a civilized way to travel, and I believe we all considered it well worth the extra charges involved.

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Many thanks to John and Pat for the great job they did in organizing and running this trip. For me personally, it was one of the best ski trips I have had.


