In an effort to raise the consciousness of all skiers with regard to safety on the slopes, Den listed many dos and don'ts for safe skiing. Illustrating his message with appropriate slides, he emphasized such sometimes forgotten, or, perhaps, never known, points as the importance of proper sun goggles, stretching exercises, proper nutrition (avoiding caffeine drinks, for instance, during the ski day), and keeping careful watch for signs of frost bite. Den also warned against skiing out of bounds (for which heavy penalities can be charged at some areas) and reminded everyone to ski "with the flow" and not to zig when everyone ahead of you is zagging.

COOK'S CORNER

November - the month that lets us know that winter is really coming - cool rainy days, leaves beginning to change colors and talk of

skiing and eating. The cook was unable to attend the PVS Octoberfest this year since Hubby and Cook were enjoying a visit to Germany. However, I know that the food was delicious as the menu is usually the same. The first recipe will allow you to try a simplified version of sauerkraut and sausage for a small group.

SAUERKRAUT AND SAUSAGE Nancy Garrett

Using a crock pot set on low heat, combine:

- 1 (12-oz.) can beer
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar
- 2 Tablespoons caraway seeds

Rinse, drain well and add to liquid: - 2 (16 oz.) cans sauerkraut

Cut in 2-inch pieces and add to mixture:
- 2 large Polish sausages
(approximately 1 lb.)

Simmer on low heat all day.

Before serving, remove sausage pieces from crock pot.

Remove 1 cup of liquid from pot. Into hot liquid, add:
- 1/2 cup instant mashed potatoes

Stir until potatoes are soft and add to sauerkraut mixture. This helps to bind it all together. With green beans and potato salad, makes a wonderful dinner. In an effort to reduce calories and cholesterol, I use light beer and smoked turkey sausage in place of Polish sausage. Serves 4.

At the September EXCOM meeting, Dina Taylor served a beautiful, scrumptious dessert. Several asked for the recipe. Dina very graciously agreed to share.

PARTY DELIGHT Dina Taylor

Grease and flour one 17 1/2-inch cookie sheet with rim or two 9-inch round cake pans.

Prepare, following directions on box:
- 1 yellow cake mix

Pour batter into cookie sheet or round pans and bake at 350* for 17-20 minutes. Cool completely.

Beat well:

- 1 box instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1 cup + 3 oz. evaporated milk

Add, continuing to beat well:
- 1 (8 oz.) package cream cheese
(at room temperature)

Spread mixture on cake.

Place on top of pudding mixture:
- 2 (13 oz.) cans crushed pineapple (drained very dry)

Following package directions, prepare:
- 3 envelopes Dream Whip

Spread over fruit. Decorate with shredded coconut or chopped nuts. Chill for several hours prior to serving to allow flavors to blend.

Crushed pineapple may be substituted with fresh strawberries, peaches, blueberries, plums, bananas, etc.

Dina placed the cake in a truffle dish for serving to the EXCOM. Layered in the dish, it was beautiful to serve and wonderful to eat. Dina recommends serving with a spoon rather that trying to cut as you would a cake.

Chilling the evaporated milk prior to beating will greatly increase the volume.
