SKI TRIP- (Yes! in August!!)-Valle Nevado and Santiago, Chile

Summary: Great skiing and eating, no injuries; I'd go back in a heartbeat.

On Thursday, August 14, National Airport (old terminal) was the scene of 15 <u>exuberant</u> folks getting a <u>leisurely</u> start to Chile (our baggage flew to JFK at 10:30 am; we went in a Gulfstream 41 at 1:30 pm). We rendezvoused there with the N.H. contingent led (?) by Jim Arnold (there were 8 intrepid souls). We all were very sorry that the Etrods and Jacques Hadler had to bail out for medical reasons at the last moment.

It's a long, long way to Chile. A wee-hours stop in Lima, Peru showed an airport that was lively and PVS'ers who weren't. Arrival in Santiago, Chile was smooth but it was "Ascuncion Thursday" meaning that baggage managers get a holiday but handlers don't, so...so slow. But

this baggage stuff was a mere bagatelle (sorry Ray)...THIS TRIP WAS GLORIOUS!

The Flake's son Robert (and Melissa) met us as scheduled; but, not as scheduled-they were married two days before. The drive to Valle Nevado was something else. Santiago is at 1500 feet elevation; Valle Nevado is at 10.000 feet and only 38 miles away. You got it--72 hairpin turns on a narrow two lane road--a few turns still had guard rails, others had twisted metal lying downslope. Our arrival at the Puerto del Sol Hotel at Valle Nevado was the signal for a massive snow dump--between 8-11 feet in 3 days. The road was closed for 2 days but the hotels (3) kept us amused with concerts, salsa dance lessons, fashion shows, aerobics and aquarobics, Batman and Robin (live) and many films, plus food and drink extraordinaire (choice of French, Italian, Swiss and Chilean everyday). An incredibly strong weather front galloped in on our third afternoon-with winds of 40 mph or more. Lifts were closed before any damage but several people had to be pulled off the chairs at the top because the head-on wind was holding them in. International ski teams (U.S., Canada, Germany, Slovenia, Italy, and others) livened up the slopes and hotels for a couple of days. The helpfulness of the staff was exemplified when Frank Shelburne lost a ski and the lift operator loaned him his. If some of this caring had gone into shoveling ice from walkways I wouldn't have landed on my derriere (magnitude 7.5 felt in Lima) by the pool--that "cured" my arthritis though. Our last day was one of the most exquisite ski days in my memory--bright sun, deep, deep blue sky and fabulous snow--and ski terrain that that just doesn't quit (40,000 acres). The neighboring area, La Parva, has the best cruising runs I've ever seen-perfectly groomed, with limitless powder between. Somehow the apres ski party got rowdy and raucous--could it be that everyone had a perfect ski day? We returned to Santiago in a more leisurely fashion than scheduled--the road was blocked for 2 hours by a vehicle which refused chains but lacked the grace to slide off the road. A uniquely Chilean thing is the "chain gang"--men along the road in uniform who remove or put on chains for \$7. Arrival at the Hotel Carrera showed us that, "Oh, Toto, we're not in Kansas anymore". Our dinner there was beyond elegant And language barriers did exist--some people were talking simultaneously about Verdi (opera) and verde (green salsa) and didn't realize it at first.

A city tour showed us a very cosmopolitan metropolis (5,000,000 people and a horrendous winter air pollution problem) with beautiful architecture, many flowers in bloom, many pedestrian walkways, and paim trees silhouetted against towering snow-covered mountains. The pre-Columbian Museum is entrancing. Lunch at the seafood market was great but marred by Bob Harmon's camera being deftly removed from his backpack (on his back). The seashore at Vina del Mar is a geologist's dream but disappointing to those seeking large beaches. Valparaiso is a clean port city (no industry) with a well protected harbor. Our "apres ski" party featured awards (a bottle of pisco sour, the national drink) for all, from the McKinleys. A wonderful dinner up on the steep San Cristobal hill, with panoramic views of the night lights

ended a very busy day.

On Monday, a trip to the Concho y Toro winery put us in good moods to brave the long trip home. Somehow, at the check-in in Santiago most of our baggage was labeled "Wolcott" (Alice Swaim's niece, Linda) so I guess we're grand-nieces and -nephews of Alice (Alice, can you handle this?). Anyway, our baggage took a slower trip than the rest of us. But we weren't in any rush for our dirty laundry anyway.

Ray and Nancy, thanks for a fabulous trip--you two are the greatest!
