

Due to logistics, we walked the Union Line first, though that would have been the third day of battle. We viewed the many monuments while Gary wove the story of the events of those days and as we gazed across the peaceful fields, we imagined the horror of the cannons and gunfire.

We had our picnic lunch at one of the monuments, returned to our cars and drove to Seminary Ridge to walk the Confederate line. Most of us made the climb up a high tower to a viewing platform where we had a wide view of the battlefields.

#### IY MEMORIUM

#### Frank Shelburne 1913-1999

Frank grew up in Bristol, VA. He came to Washington in the 1930's and worked as a court reporter on Capitol Hill. He spent the rest of his life in Washington, leaving only during WW II when he served in the US Army in Karachi, India.

Frank discovered organized hiking about 1960 when he joined the Wanderbirds Hiking Club. He became a very active member of the club, serving as president and leading many hikes, usually the longer and tougher ones. He liked to bioneer new hikes and popularized hiking on Great North Mt. on the border of VA and WV. He was also active in the Potomac Appalachian Frail Club, maintaining a section of trail for many years.

Frank took up skiing in the 1960's when he and fellow hiker Svava Vernhards (also a PVSer) would frive up to Braddock Heights west of Frederick for night skiing. Since he was pretty much self-taught, his skiing style was never polished, but he was a very strong skier and absolutely fearless. Hispreferred method of attacking a ski area was to start at one side and go down every trail in turn. During many years of skiing with Frank, I made too many terrifying runs down black trails, but somehow we always survived. Only several years ago, Frank decided to bash the moguls on Rolex at Steamboat. I waited at the bottom to pick up the pieces, but he made it unscathed. He was planning to ski at Snowmass this winter and was going to buy himself a pair of the new shaped skis.

Frank professed a belief in reincarnation. Given the good and meritorious life he led this time around, one can hope that in his next life he will come back as a climber of Mt. Everest or a member of the US ski team.
