
Spring has sprung!

# Chamonix/Prague 2002

Chamonix is truly an extraordinary place. Not only is it a world class ski resort but it is spectacularly beautiful. Nestled at the base of Mont Blanc, Europe's highest peak at 4810 meters, it offers beautiful views of mountain peaks and glacier ice falls. We were able to enjoy this beauty immediately upon our arrival as the bright sun and warm temperature beckoned us to explore Chamonix.

Those traveling from Washington had an uneventful trip, other than the traffic we encountered as our bus approached Chamonix. The Mont Blanc tunnel that connects the Chamonix valley with Italy was reopening the day we arrived, having been closed for three years following a deadly fire. This event brought out many people, and demonstrators protesting the opening of the tunnel to trucks only added to the congestion.

The Morzine contingent (Leaders Joan and Glade Flake, Suzanne Boisclair, Walt and Annemarie Brenner, John Smith and Pat Tengel) were not as fortunate, having encountered problems with their reservations (or lack thereof) on Swissair. Their problems began at Dulles and continued to the Geneva-Prague segment. Seems as if the Swissair computer that issued the reservation hadn't talked to the central computer. The Morzine contingent was, however, rewarded with excellent skiing while there.

Despite the poorest snow cover in 15 years, skiing at Chamonix was very good and we had our pick of the many areas easily accessible by bus from our hotel: LeTour provided us with many blue and red runs, La Flegere and Le Brevent with blacks, Les Grandes Montets with high altitude glacier skiing, and Aiguille du Midi with a scary ridge descent and a 20 km run to the valley floor. Some of the PVS group including David Lerner, Jim Stahler, Bob Marx, Mary Ward, and Reg Heitchue were assisted by guide Philippe Henry on some of the more challenging pistes.

Thursday evening featured a lovely dinner and dancing for the entire BRSC group of 125. The PVS contingent put on a very strong showing on the dance floor with solid performances by Gene and Wilma Sharer, Jim Stahler, Dottie Villers, Walt and Annemarie Brenner, Kerry and Marianne Hines, and Maria and Dewey Coggins.

But who cares where we are from? We are a ukneeque (oops!) group of individuals, and our name should reflect our singularity. I've given the matter considerable thought and analysis (a full 90 seconds) and decided that since we are a group of caring, sharing, long-time skiers, we should change our name to Knowledgeable, Nice, Exciting, Expert Skiers.

It is long, but it has a lovely ring--and a truly super acronym. Try it out.
