Proposed Bylaws Amendments

At the March ExCom meeting, the ExCom approved the following amendments to the PVS bylaws. The proposed amendments are included in this copy of the TOOT to fulfill the requirement in SECTION VI of the bylaws that the proposed amendments be mailed to all active members fifteen days before the meeting at which they are proposed. The amendments will be voted on at the April membership meeting.

Amendment A:

Background:

Currently members can vote on a bylaws amendment if they are present at the meeting at which the voting takes place. Absent members get no vote for bylaws actions. Amendment A changes SECTION VI – AMENDMENTS of the bylaws to allow voting by members who cannot attend the meeting at which the voting takes place.

Current version:

Subsection A. ... "The club will mail copies of the proposed amendment along with ballots to all active members fifteen days before the meeting at which they are voted upon."

Subsection B. ... "Adoption of a proposed amendment shall require a favorable vote of two-thirds of the active members of the club present and voting."

Proposed version:

Subsection A. "The club will send copies of the proposed amendment along with instructions to obtain an absentee ballot to all voting members fifteen days before the meeting at which they are voted upon."

Subsection B. "Adoption of a proposed amendment shall require a favorable vote of two-thirds of the votes cast by active members."

Amendment B:

Background:

With various amendments to the bylaws over the years, many of the clauses and subsections are incorrectly numbered. For example SECTION I – MEMBERSHIP identifies two subsection #1s, two subsection #2s, subsections A through C followed by new wording in subsections A through E. Since these bylaws are posted on our web site, we need to clean this up.

Amendment B authorizes changes to the enumeration of the bylaws to a correct sequence with no changes in wording. The Secretary, subject to review by the Executive Committee, is authorized to correct the enumeration of bylaws subsections.

Amendment C:

Background:

Currently the President appoints the Nominating Committee Chair and all the committee members (no fewer than five). Amendment C changes SECTION III – GOVERNMENT AND ELECTIONS of the bylaws to allow the Nominating Committee Chair to select the members of the Nominating Committee in consultation with the President.

Current version:

Subsection H. "The President shall appoint a Nominating Committee Chairman and a Nominating Committee of no fewer than five additional members at least three months prior to the election date." ...

Proposed version:

Subsection H. "The President shall appoint a Nominating Committee Chairman at least three months prior to the election date. The Nominating Committee Chairman shall select a Nominating Committee of no fewer than five additional members in consultation with the President." ... continued...

Amendment D:

Background:

There is no provision for the Vice President (an elected position) to have a vote in Executive Committee matters. Amendment D changes SECTION III – GOVERNMENT AND ELECTIONS of the bylaws to allow for the Vice President to have a vote on Executive Committee matters.

NOTE: ExCom understands that an even number of voters (8) precludes a tie-breaker in the event of a 50/50 vote split. However, an odd number of voters pro/con would be realized if one member abstains or is absent from the meeting.

Current version:

Subsection A. "The club shall be governed by a President and six active members in good standing who shall form the Board of Directors, which shall also be known as the Executive Committee."

Proposed version:

Subsection A. "The club shall be governed by a President, Vice President and six active members in good standing who shall form the Executive Committee. Each member of the Executive Committee shall have one vote on the Executive Committee."

Amendment E:

<u>Background</u>: The bylaws list the membership categories and associated biennial dues. A change in any dues requires a bylaws amendment. Amendment F changes SECTION II - FINANCE of the bylaws to allow the Executive Committee to make changes in the dues structure with a "super majority" vote of two thirds.

Current version:

Subsection B. "Biennial dues: dues are based on the member's status at the beginning of the membership cycle. The biennial dues shall be:

Individual	\$40.00
Couple	70.00
Absentee Member	20.00
Junior Member	20.00
Applicant - Individual	50.00
Applicant – Couple	90.00"

Proposed version:

Subsection B. "Biennial are based on the member's status at the beginning of the membership cycle. The membership categories are: individual, couple, absentee member, junior member, applicant – individual, and applicant – couple. The Executive Committee may make changes in the dues structure by a two-thirds vote of all ExCom members. "

Amendment F:

Background:

There are currently 5 requirements for membership. The applicant must be sponsored by an active member, submit an application with dues, attend three club meetings, ski at least three days with a club member and/or pass the USAA Uniform Basic Ski Test, and be voted on by the members at the annual meeting. Amendment F changes SECTION I – MEMBERSHIP of the bylaws to replace one of the membership requirements (ski at least three days with a club member or members and/or pass the USAA Uniform Basic Ski Test or display equivalent skiing ability) with a more practical approach.

Current version:

Subsection B3(a)"a. Ski at least three days with a club member or members.

a. Pass the USAA Uniform Basic Skit Test or display equivalent skiing ability.

Proposed version:

Subsection B4 (after being renumbered) "Demonstrate skiing ability by skiing with a club member or members."


COMING EVENTS

"Avantil" was the cry as a group of 23 bleary-eyed PVSers and guests arrived at the Hotel Bologna near Venice on Thursday afternoon, February 26. After a long but uneventful journey from Washington, most of the group immediately headed to the train station to go to downtown Venice. Some members of the group decided to meet later at about 6:00 at the famous Harry's Bar. It turns out that good skiers are not necessarily good navigators. After first taking the right train in the wrong direction, then taking the right vaporetto (water taxi) in the wrong direction and going out to sea, they arrived at the dry warmth of Harry's Bar several hours late for some of the best drinks ever served.

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After another cold rainy day in Venice of great eating, drinking and shopping, we headed to Cortina for a week of skiing. We were joined by PVSers Demetrios Chaconas and Joel Edelman. Because more than half of the trip members were sailors, it was most appropriate that we stayed at the charming Hotel Ancora (the Anchor Hotel). The cuisine (or should I say cocina) was outstanding. We enjoyed superbly prepared and presented four-course dinners with an incredible dessert buffet every night.

The skiing conditions were also superlative. The natives claimed that the snow this season was the best in 50 years -- fresh snow, packed powder, nice temperatures, and six straight days of sunshine and blue skies with no rain or snow. It was heavenly! Sunday and Monday were spent exploring some of the many slopes in the Cortina area: Faloria, Tofana, Socrepes, Falzarego and more. The scenery of the heavily snow-covered Dolomite mountains was breathtaking everywhere. On Tuesday, the non-skiers joined the skiers at the top of Faloria for a group lunch and to observe the locals sunning themselves in beach chairs.

Tuesday was the day of the Sella Ronda ski tour - an all day rugged tour for 32 kilometers (20 miles) around the Sella Mountains led by Alpine guide Paulo. The bus trip from Cortina through the Falzarego Pass was delayed due to an avalanche. The group skied a bit more than half of the Sella Ronda tour before being stopped by an inoperative ski lift, so they reversed course and returned to the starting point. On the way back, Demetrios turned up missing but was able to rejoin the group after a critical cell phone call to Paulo from the top of the mountain.

On Wednesday there was a bus trip to Padua, which is famous for a beautiful little chapel with interior walls and ceiling covered with frescoes painted by Giotto. Padua is also famous for its university and medical school. Several of the recently graduated dottore (doctors) were celebrating apparently Italianstyle. This included an X-rated scene that I can't describe because it is too graphic for a family publication like the TOOT!

Thursday some of the skiers went on a bus trip through some spectacular scenery to the Civetta ski area – a huge area of wide well-groomed trails, all blue and red runs, all interconnected, great intermediate territory. Friday wrapped up the week in Cortina. For the non-skiers there was an excursion to the town of Bressanone and a wine tasting at a lovely nearby abbey and winery. The hotel owner, Flavia, had invited the skiers to ski with her but she was living on a time that was 15 minutes later than everyone else and missed the whole group.

Saturday the group moved to Vienna. Ah, springtime in Vienna! We expected temperatures of 60 F, blooming flowers etc. – but not this year. We were greeted with four days of intermittent snow and temperatures from 30-35F. We had one other disappointment in Vienna. Vienna has monuments to all the famous Austrians. We looked everywhere but never found the monument for Arnold Schwarzenegger! After four great days of sightseeing, going to the opera, seeing the Lippizans, shopping, and enjoying the great food and music of Vienna, it was time to head home.

Many thanks go to trip leaders Glade Flake and John Smith for all their hard work in preparing for and leading a wonderful ski trip. To them we say a heartfelt Italian "grazie". Arrivederci Cortina!

PVS is sometimes unofficially referred to as PVS&E (i.e., Skiers and Eaters), and I would say on this particular trip the "E" (together with sight-seeing) took precedence over the "S." Not that the skiing was necessarily that bad--in depends on whom you asked. After the first day on the slopes at the Sierra Nevada in Spain David Abraham pronounced the skiing awful (in so many words), while Nestor Delevaux (also in so many words) said the skiing was great. The opinions of others seemed to range between these two views.

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The one and only serious injury of the trip occurred on the second day of skiing, but it didn't happen on the slopes. Ironically, Ilse Keel had chosen not to ski, but she took a tumble in her hotel room and broke her right arm (of course she is right-handed)!

During our entire stay in Spain we were accompanied by an excellent guide, Gerardo. Among the many points of interest he took us to were two of the country's outstanding architectural wonders. In Granada, where we stayed for five days, it was the Alhambra, a Moorish citadel-palace most of which dates from the 14th century--a magnificent layout of ornately decorated buildings, walls, gardens, and fountains. And from Granada we took a side-trip to Córdoba to see the former Moslem mosque, the construction of which was commenced in the 8th century. The impression of the interior is that of a forest of columns supporting two tiers of beautiful superimposed arches. An especially striking feature of the landscape between Granada and Córdoba was the mile after mile of rows of olive trees stretching back over rolling hills as far as the eye could see. Before we left Spain we also went to Gibraltar, where we rode up the hill to see and photograph the monkeys--touristy but fun!

The scenery in Spain was spectacular. To single out one example of many I would mention the ravine below the town of Ronda. Ronda is a town like many another in Spain until you come to an overlook in a town park, from which you can look down into a valley hundreds of feet below with winding roads, a stream, occasional houses, cultivated fields, terraced olive and almond tree orchards, and behind it all a range of mountains as a backdrop. An incredible view!

From Spain we took a ferry to Tanger in Morocco, where we picked up another excellent guide, Ishmael, who was with us for the rest of our trip. On the following day we proceeded on to Fes, stopping en route to visit the fascinating old Roman settlement of Volubilis, dating back to the first century AD. That's about as far south as the Romans got in western Africa, according to my historical atlas.

From Fes we went on to Marrakech in due course. In both Fes and Marrakech we visited the local "souks," market places reminiscent of the bazaars in the Middle East. The souks consist of tangles of narrow, winding streets lined by (seemingly) thousands of shops huddled shoulder to shoulder. The streets of the souks are crowded with pedestrians and heavily-laden donkeys and mules for which you have to constantly make way--a point which was forcefully brought home to Jean Heitchue when one of the heavilyladen donkeys stepped on her foot!

In the souks we visited a number of craft shops, most notably carpet manufactories where several of our group did their best to boost the Moroccan economy. Those who shopped were well advised to put their haggling skills (euphemistically referred to as "negotiating skills") into practice, which wasn't really that difficult--you had but to head out the door when the salesman, as likely as not, would come running after you to offer a better deal.

One evening in Marrakech we went for dinner to Chez Ali, and what an extravaganza! On the long walk from the entrance to the grounds to our assigned tent we were regaled like visiting royalty by several groups of musicians wearing their regional costumes. During the typical Moroccan meal there was folk music and dancing (for which some of us were called on to be audience participants). Following the meal the entertainment continued in an outdoor arena, consisting of a mélange of more exotic dancing, sound and light, fireworks, and acrobatics on horseback performed by Berber horsemen.

We had just one day of skiing in Morocco, and that was at Oukaimeden in the Atlas Mountains. Getting there required about an hour's drive up and up and up a very twisty road without much in the way of barriers on the shoulders--not a trip for persons with acrophobia! The skiing possibilities were modest--there were a couple of poma lifts and a chairlift. But 8 inches of new snow had fallen during the night so conditions were fairly good, and those who skied enjoyed it. The chairlift was some distance from the pomas, but donkey drivers were on hand to convey skiers to the chair. One of the drivers sported a Washington Redskins jacket!

We all survived the earthquake which occurred while we were in Fes, though most of us felt a moderate shaking in our beds in the middle of the night. The epicenter was about 200 miles to the northeast, and tragically it took upward of 600 lives.

One surprising bit of information I learned on the trip was the fact that Jeanette Albersheim drives (or did drive until recently) a Harley-Davidson. Somehow she doesn't seem like the H-D type! Ask her about it sometime!

I think it surprised most of us that it was so chilly in Morocco, though Ishmael told us it was normal for the season. I noted that Marrakech lies at about the same latitude as Savannah, GA, so it would seem as though we might have expected somewhat warmer weather!

This year's National Ski Club Newsletter made mention of our trip as the most adventurous they had heard about across the country. Neither Spain nor Morocco would be the place to go for the most fabulous ski vacation of a lifetime, but we knew that from the outset. I suspect that all 27 participants would agree that the trip was quite special--the serious skiing can wait for another time! Many thanks to Ray and Nancy for doing a great job in organizing and leading a very enjoyable trip.
