

Scandinavian Smörgåsbord (Feb/Mar 2006)

Right before our group departed for Scandinavia we received the joyful news that Oslo had just overtaken Tokyo as the world's most expensive city. But it seems we all shared the same attitude: well, so be it—we're only young once, so let's live it up and hang the cost!


The trip was designated as a "see and ski" trip but there was a whole lot more seeing than skiing, which was fine with us because there was plenty to see. There were guided tours in each city we visited, and lots in the way of museums, art galleries, churches, palaces, and the like. And of course there was shopping. (I have concluded that shopping is hard-wired to the X chromosome but is fairly rare in the Y chromosome!)

We started out in Lillehammer, site of the 1994 winter Olympics. There we had the opportunity to ski 5 days, but only 3 of our group of 14 skied 4 days. They declared the skiing great at Hafjell with plenty of snow and slopes. Three others skied one day and that was the full extent of our skiing!

Several of us took a side trip from Lillehammer by train, bus, and taxi to the very scenic city of Bergen. The trip itself was also scenic, especially since there was a thick blanket of new snow covering the countryside. En route a most unusual misadventure befell Ivan Bekey. Perhaps it was because the train's wheels were a bit jouncy at that point, but while attempting to squirt some caviar from a tube onto a roll, he somehow managed to squirt some up his nose. What a waste of caviar! Ray, true to form said "That's snot funny!" but Ivan's wife, Marlene, thought it was very funny!

Before arriving in Bergen we interrupted our trip to take a boat ride through Aurland and Naeroey Fjords, the latter being the narrowest fjord in Norway. It was awesome to see the high mountains rising abruptly from close to the water, with small villages tucked in amongst them here and there.

Our next destination after Lillehammer was Oslo, where in the hotel lobby Marlene by chance encountered an acquaintance she had met last year in the metropolis of Decorah, lowa, at a symposium on Norwegian folk art. What are the odds against that happening!? One of the highlights in Oslo was the Vigeland sculpture park, which included over 200 sculptures, mainly of the human figure, in bronze, granite, and forged iron by Gustav Vigeland, who was the architect of the park. An incredible achievement! We also saw the Holmenkollen ski jump and visited the Viking Ship Museum which houses three of the best preserved



Viking ships, discovered in burial sites dating back over 1,100 years.

From Oslo we flew to Stockholm which has an especially interesting Old Town, the site of the royal palace, the "great church," and many other centuries-old buildings. We had interesting quided tours of both the royal palace and the palace of Drottningholm, located a few miles outside the city, part of which is the official residence of the royal family. Both palaces date from the 18th century and both show the influence of the Palace of Versailles. Of special interest was the Wasa Museum, which houses the very large warship, Wasa, built in 1628 and intended to be the pride of Sweden's navy. However, being topheavy with too many cannons on the upper deck, it toppled over and sank on its maiden voyage while still in the harbor, and was not raised until 1961! No one could be punished for the screw-up since it was designed to meet the specifications of the King, who was above the law!

European Trip reviews



After Stockholm we proceeded by overnight ferry (in reality a luxurious cruise ship) to Tallinn, the capital of Estonia. Long stretches of the Baltic Sea were completely

iced over, and it was fascinating to watch our ferry effortlessly plow through it. Tallinn seemed to be the favorite destination for most of our group. It has a very attractive medieval inner city with buildings dating from the 13th to the 16th century, and a large central square dominated by the imposing city hall. Church spires and steeples abound. Large sections of the old city wall are still standing, as are 26 of the original 45 towers. You



can still walk along some parts of the wall, and sections of it were incorporated into the walls of our hotel.

Our activities in Tallinn included a medieval meal (both menu and ambiance) in the restaurant Olde Hansa, attending a performance of the ballet "La Dame aux Camelias," by the Estonian National Ballet Company, and a visit to a Dominican monastery.

Ray and Nancy make a well-balanced team. Whatever the subject under consideration, Ray typically describes it with unbounded, exuberant enthusiasm, which Nancy often tempers with a more dispassionate, down-to-earth (and may I say usually more accurate?!) assessment! Anyway, we thank them both heartily for once again leading a top-notch trip!

It is a truly beautiful area, very Tirolean, with wonderful shops full of local woodcarvings, cuckoo clocks and Italian wares. There were large statues everywhere carved of wood, and huge frozen fountains. Tours during our week in Italy were in Bolzano, Venice and Verona (where some of our group had their own self-guided experience).

There were lots of shopping opportunities on this trip. Sylvia Lukens was the gueen of shopping, admiring fashion in Bolzano and Verona. Husband Wally didn't seem to mind. Joan Flake and Tina Henley were on a mission to buy 12 purses for friends back home, picking up a few necklaces of edelweiss and snowflake design along the way.
