May great snow conditions, unblemished camaraderie and goodwill be with us all for many years to come.



PROPOSED BY-LAWS AMENDMENT 2007

The ExCom proposes an amendment to the By Laws of Potomac Valley Skiers, Inc. to encourage the outcome of increasing the actively skiing membership. The proposed amended language is depicted in the **bolded** words in the section listing Active Member requirements as follows:

SECTION I - MEMBERSHIP

A. An intended member who is not a charter member is termed an applicant. An applicant must:

- 1. Be invited and sponsored by an active member in good standing
- 2. Submit a written application for membership together with dues. Attend at least three club meetings **OR** three **PVS** functions **OR** ski with **PVS** members on two or more week-long **PVS**-endorsed ski trips **OR** host one club meeting and attend at least one **PVS** function.
- 3. Ski at least three days with a club member or members.
- 4. Display skiing ability
- 5. Notwithstanding the above provisions, if otherwise convinced of the applicant's qualifications for membership, upon a two-thirds vote of all Ex Com members.
- 6. Be approved by vote of the members at the annual meeting, provided, however, that five or more negative votes shall be sufficient to bar an applicant from **membership in** the club.

The amended By-Laws would provide other (and often more meaningful) opportunities to get to know Applicant Members than the current three club meeting attendance. As we've seen in the reduction in meeting attendance over the years, meetings can be difficult to get to; particularly for individuals who work evenings, live/work somewhat distant from the DC area, or have other (family) commitments.

Also, the amended By-Laws would formalize that practice whereby ExCom has waived a requirement when the Applicant Member essentially fulfilled the spirit of our requirements. For example: participated on four PVS ski trips but attended only one meeting. This provision would require a super-majority of six ExCom votes in the affirmative.

Votes can be cast either by mail or by vote at the meeting.

To vote by postal service, mail the form below to Mary Beale at 4040 51st St. NW, Washington, DC 20016. Be sure to put a return address label on the envelope. Mary will take the unopened envelopes to the annual meeting, and hand them to Inspector of Ballots, John Smith. If you come to the April meeting, the envelope will be returned to you and you can vote from the floor. Mail-in votes are due by <u>April 12</u>, <u>2007</u>.



ski and See the Balkans

Sunday, March 2 through Thursday, March 13, 2008

This trip offers the opportunity to ski in two countries (Bulgaria and Slovenia), tour two capital cities (Sofia and Ljubljana), and experience the unique culture of this region where eastern and western cultures merge.

TRIP OVERVIEW -- We depart Washington/Dulles at 5:20 pm, transfer in Munich, Germany, for Sofia, Bulgaria, and overnight in a 4-star hotel in Sofia (breakfast included). The next day we tour Sofia before transferring late in the afternoon by bus (about a 2-hour trip) to a 5-star hotel in Bansko at the gondola station (breakfast and dinner included). Erich Windisch, Died at 89; Revolutionized Ski Jumping

Erich Windisch, whose adjustment to an injured shoulder reshaped the sport of ski jumping, bringing competitors' arms to their sides, died Feb. 14 near his home in Vail, Colo. He was 89.

It was during a tournament in his native Germany in 1949 that Windisch left his slightly arched arms pointing downward and — to the surprise of his competitors and hundreds of spectators — soared farther than all the other jumpers. Windisch had dislocated a shoulder during a practice run several weeks earlier. "He did it to protect his shoulder," said Justin Henderson, curator of the Colorado Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame in Vail, into which Windisch was inducted in 1994. "The traditional position was to have your arms forward, in a Superman kind of position."

The position's aerodynamic advantage was soon demonstrated in wind-tunnel tests in Switzerland, but Henderson pointed out that the position also caught on quickly because the leap had happened at a large European meet.

Erich Alfred Windisch was born in Shoeneck, Germany, on Jan. 14, 1918. He started skiing at 3 and won his first race at 7. During World War II, he was a captain with the German army's mountain troops in Russia. For five years in the late 1940s and early '50s, he was a member of the German national ski-jumping team. Windisch moved to Colorado in 1947. Besides his daughter, Sasha, he is survived by his wife, the former Elena Bercovici.

For 39 years, he was an instructor and supervisor at the Vail Ski and Snowboard School, taking a particular interest in teaching beginners. In 1994, a trail on Vail Mountain leading to Golden Peak, the beginner's area on the mountain, was named Windisch Way.



In the early hours of Saturday, March 3, 23 PVSers left Dulles for Vancouver, Canada, and on to Sun Peaks Resort in British Columbia via chartered bus. It wasn't long before someone noted that there were five Bobs among the group, with the surnames of Harmon, Jablon, Knopes, Marx, and McNeill, collectively known throughout the trip as "the five Bobs." Jan Marx noted that she shared the trip's final dinner in Vancouver with three of the now famous group of "five Bobs."



Thanks to the trip leaders, Nancy and Ray McKinley, we all had a great time. Everything was on schedule and went smoothly, beginning with a brief reception on our arrival at Nancy Greene's Cahilty Lodge with Nancy Greene and her husband, Al Raine, a former coach of Canada's women's' national ski team. Nancy was the first North American woman to win an Olympic gold medal in Alpine skiing, and is one of Canada's national treasures. She also is a wonderful hostess.

Our first full day at Sun Peaks began with a guided tour of the ski area by local Sun Guides. It was good that we had them if only because of limited visibility caused by fog and low-lying clouds. Nevertheless, it was a good day of skiing despite the poor vision. The day was made better by Al's and Nancy's evening reception for our group, and topped-off by an excellent group dinner at a local restaurant, The Steak House.



On Monday morning, Nancy Greene and Al Raine personally escorted our PVS group around a variety of the area's many ski slopes. Ah -- to ski like Nancy Greene!! As we did every evening but one when time simply was not available, we ended the day with a happy hour at the McKinleys' suite. One of the most entertaining happy hours was one where Ray had each of us telling why and when we took up skiing. Some of the stories were hilarious.

In addition to The Steak House group dinner, we had two others. One was at an Italian restaurant with great food and the third was a fondue dinner in a beautiful lodge that was accessed by snowshoe. When we first heard back in PVS territory that the Sun Peaks trip included the showshoe feature, I and I'm sure most others envisioned gliding over powdery show on a beautiful moonlit night. It was guite unlike that. There was no moon

in sight nor was the snow of the powdery variety. Rather, the snow was covered by a slippery, icy crust that led to a number of falls, but fortunately no injuries. Our further good fortunes were that the fondue dinner and setting were spectacular, and that vans from the Cahilty Lodge safely returned us to our temporary home.



Although there were no snowshoe related accidents, there was one in mid-week when one of "the five Bobs," Bob Harmon, fell and dislocated his shoulder in an isolated area where he was cross country skiing by himself. Luckily, he was able to walk to the Umbrella Café where the ski patrol was summoned. They took him to their clinic where, also luckily, a doctor on site re-located (reduced) his shoulder and sent Bob to a hospital in the neighboring town of Kamloops. After x-rays determined that there was no further damage, Bob took a taxi back to the hotel. He is O.K. Ask Bob about noncitizen hospital costs and the taxi cost.

Many of our members now have ski helmets. Joe Jevcak joined the wise people and purchased one. He says the helmet is not all he hoped for because, during his first run in his new helmet, he demonstrated a 5 star yard sale, and sprained his THUMB. Ice and loving care from Liz enabled him to ski the remaining days. Maybe a thumb helmet???

Also mid-week, a starlet was born from the PVS ranks. Sun Peaks was in process of developing marketing tools for the area, including the filming of a dog sled ride featuring none other than our own June Read-Martin as the occupant of the sled. You can view June's pictures on the Sun Peaks web site. What a performance!!



PVS AT THE BRSC EUROFEST- SCHLADNING, AUSTRIA

On a beautiful Monday, February 26, 11 people (Joan and Glade Flake, Reg and Jean Heitchue, Sylvia and Wally Lukens, John Pulos, Shirley Rettig and her sister Beverly, Pat Tengel, and John Smith) on the PVS trip to Europe escaped the Washington area snow and ice and left Dulles airport for Munich, Germany and on to Athens, Greece. On Tuesday we arrived in a warm and sunny Athens at the beautiful Divini Palace hotel. We found a really nice local restaurant for a dinner of fine Greek specialties.



While in Athens, several of the group took a guided bus tour to see the historic sites of Athens that included the Acropolis, the original Olympic stadium, the Temple of Olympian Zeus. John Pulos was especially helpful with translating the Greek signs for us and with talking with the locals. On Thursday, March 1st, we

had the earliest start of the boating season in many years when we took a beautiful boat trip from Piraeus, the harbor of Athens, to visit three of the nearby Greek Islands in the Aegean Sea. We first visited the small islands of Poros and Hydra. These are beautiful little islands that are a combination of old fishing villages and newer tourist areas. The local transport on these islands is still by four legged taxi (donkeys), for carrying people, goods, and even construction equipment around the hilly islands. No cars because of the very narrow paths and the steep hills. On the larger island of Aegina, we took a bus trip around the island to see the ancient temple of Aphaia and the more recent Aghios Nektarios Monastery. In more recent times it has become a prominent summer tourist attraction and is the home to many artists and craftsmen. The Kaiservilla, which is the summer residence of the Hapsburg dynasty, is located in the spa town of Bad Ischl.

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On Tuesday, Wally had a great time skiing with a guide and he was particularly excited about the fine skiing. John, Hilde, and Shirley went to ski the magnificent Dachstein Glacier. The snow was beautiful and the trails were very well groomed; the best snow in Schladming. The scenery from the top of the glacier was magnificent. Reg, Jean, and John Pulos came along to the restaurant at the top of the glacier to enjoy the wonderful view. On Wednesday, the Flakes, the Lukens, Shirley, and Beverly went back to the glacier hoping to ski the beautiful snow. version in that, in addition to the melted cheese and potatoes, there are various meats for cooking at the table.

On Saturday we left by bus to go to Vienna. Rain! Rain! Rain! on the bus ride until we approached Vienna in the mid-afternoon when the rain stopped and we arrived in beautiful sunshine and warmth. Ah! Vienna in the Springtime - how lovely. Sunday was a beautiful warm (about 65 degrees) and sunny

day. Lukens and Heitchues took a bus tour of Vienna and the Schonbrun palace. Shirley and Beverly went to see the Lipizzan stallions in their gala performance. Pat and John visited the very interesting Freud museum and then spent time at the Freud café for lunch. The Flakes and John Pulos toured Vienna on foot to see the Rathaus, the Parliament building, and the cathedral. In the evening, several of the people went to a lovely concert of

Mozart and Straus music. Monday - more touring of beautiful Vienna and fine eating in the cafes. Joan and Glade found the wonderful Griechenbeisl Café, the oldest café in Vienna, that was recommended by Marianne Cook. On Tues. Mar 6, the Flakes traveled by train to Kitzbuhl, Austria to have lunch with Bill and Elke Stecher (Bill was one of the founders of PVS). Kitzbuhl was the half way point as the Stechers were staying in Imst with their ski club.
