Similarly, near-by Keystone opens the newly accessible Independence Bowl, an addition of almost 300 acres to this quite large resort.

Another ski-country development recently highlighted in a New York Times article (November 19, page TR 3) is the ski industry's trying hard to attract families, whether through more innovative, affordable packages or programs that make families enjoy skiing together.

Potentially useful to note at this time of year, when conditions can be, shall we say, lousy, it's good to know that one condo rental outfit, ResortQuest, with properties in Colorado, Utah, Idaho and B.C., is offering a Snow Guarantee. If you've booked for one of their properties and the conditions are, ok, we've said it already, they'll let you choose another place, though you've got to take care of transportation.

There are all kinds of useful tid-bits in the various print and Internet sources, which are so abundantly available nowadays. One such, in the monthly SKI magazine, has useful tips for improving one's on-mountain performance. It's worth a read before heading out there.

Have a jolly good time doing what we love doing, and a joyous Holiday Season too.

Chili Hike



November Meeting

Brian Eardley did it again...

.....he keeps us in the loop about advances in ski equipment. Although his accumulated knowledge of the equipment rides in tandem with our accumulated experience in using it, he always has the latest information for us. Because he has known the group for more than 25 years, he tailors his information to focus on our needs. The fun for me is that Brian is now experiencing, thus understanding better, how the older body must adapt to the sport. Here are some highlights:

<u>BOOTS</u>: Nordica has re-introduced the Rear Entry Boot! (Do I hear cheers from many of you?) They also have buckle adjustments and sell for about \$345. Head has pure women's boot, Lange has a female outer boot, and Solomon has narrow heel models for men and women.

They are getting lighter. Moving away from the binding/ski system, although Atomic has a light weight binding system. Brian prefers separate components because it brings down the cost, makes the whole package lighter, and YOUR balance on the skies can be adjusted, as well as the cant, if you need it. He has learned that alignment of fore and aft balance of you on your ski/binding influences the amount of weight on the ball of your feet. Older feet need to be positioned properly to take stress off of the ball of the feet. Younger feet can absorb bumps better. Brian has new equipment for alignment of fore and aft balance on the binding. Brian predicts that twin tip skies will be the norm in a few years. Ladies skis continue to be lighter, more shaped, and have great graphics. Fat Love and

NOTIONS: HotTronic boot heaters have a new version that lasts longer.

Marker goggles give extra clarity to your vision - less distortion; however the single lens

tends to fog up. (They may have corrected that.) The yellow in regular goggles is the best color. Photochromatic lenses: red lenses are poor because the pupils dilate too slowly. Changing lenses extra - better, changes instantly.

Snoop Daddy are popular.






