directory. User names and passwords are derived from the PVS roster. The password list will be updated on December 15 to match the roster that was distributed with the November TOOT. Please send e-mail to webmaster@pvskiers.org if you have trouble logging in or if you would like to have your user name or password changed.

User names are taken directly from the PVS roster. Omit spaces and punctuation. For example, my user name is DavidLerner. Capitalization is important. The web hosting company does not support user names that are more than 12 characters in length. Enter only the first 12 letters of your name, as it appears in the roster, to fit this limit.

Your password is the first 8 characters of the e-mail address listed for you in the PVS roster. (Your phone number is used if you do not have a listed e-mail address.) Retain capitalization and punctuation as it appears in the roster. Example: Dave@aol. Here, the web hosting company restricts us to 8 characters, so it is necessary to stop at the 8<sup>th</sup> character, and you must have 8.


