It is cold in Val Gardena; they were making snow and planned to open for skiing by the 26<sup>th</sup> of November. School is taught in both Italian and German, so everyone is bilingual, English is widely spoken as the normal foreign language. I didn't get to use my German because their English was far superior.

The slopes, which cover an expanse of desert sand the size of three soccer fields, are covered with manufactured snow year-round, reports BBC News. The snow is made by shooting water at high pressure into an atmosphere maintained near freezing by coolers below and above the park. The park's features include tobogganing, icy bobsleigh runs and a ski school. And for the entrance price of \$35, visitors can avail themselves of all necessary clothing and equipment, including knee-length padded coats for any Arabs who prefer to frolic in the snow wearing their traditional kandouras.
