


# Spain and Morocco

### Tour Of The Albert Powell Fish Hatchery And Alpaca Farm



May 28, 2003

Six PVSers departed on Wednesday morning, and soon ran into heavy rain, however, we arrived at the Fish Hatchery near Hagerstown, Maryland at 10 a.m. just as the rain started to ease up, and it soon quit. We were fortunate to get Manager Wade Moore to tell us about the Fish Hatchery. We were impressed with his knowledge and bombarded him with questions. Approximately 600,000 eggs are purchased in November and are hatched in incubators and then transferred indoors to 20 foot fiberglass troughs. Here they are fed and cared for until they grow to 2 to 5 inches when they are then transferred to outdoor raceways. The raceways are supplied with water from the state's second largest spring flowing at an approximate 3,000 gallons per minute at a constant 54 degrees, an ideal temperature for trout propensity.

It takes about 16 months for a trout to grow to 12 inches when they are stocked in Maryland streams. The Fish Hatchery has been in existence for 55 years. They have now progressed to where they now lose less than 5% of the fish.

We then drove a couple of miles north to the Alpaca Farm. The owner, Bert Kramer, gave us an impressive tour of the barn and forty alpacas grazing in the pastureland. The males were separated several hundred yards away from the females. Alpacas live 20 to 22 years, and have one baby per year with a gestation period of 11 to 12 months. All the animals had just been shorn. The wool is soft comparable to cashmere and is strong and durable. The fleece is sold to mills where it can be dyed and spun into yarn. We then visited the gift shop, which had scarves, hats, socks, rugs, bags, dolls, sweaters, and other clothing items made from the wool. After purchasing several items, we drove to Ryan's in the mall on the west side of Hagerstown, and stuffed ourselves at the luncheon buffet before returning home.
