Bob Grasley -- 1915 to 2007

ski and See the Balkans

Sunday, March 2 through Thursday, March 13, 2008

This trip offers the opportunity to ski in two countries (Bulgaria and Slovenia), tour two capital cities (Sofia and Ljubljana), and experience the unique culture of this region where eastern and western cultures merge.

TRIP OVERVIEW -- We depart Washington/Dulles at 5:20 pm, transfer in Munich, Germany, for Sofia, Bulgaria, and overnight in a 4-star hotel in Sofia (breakfast included). The next day we tour Sofia before transferring late in the afternoon by bus (about a 2-hour trip) to a 5-star hotel in Bansko at the gondola station (breakfast and dinner included). After four nights and three days skiing (elective day tours are possible to Rila Monastery, Sofia, the town of Bansko, and other sites of interest), we return to Sofia and fly to Ljubljana, Slovenia. We overnight in Ljubljana in a 4-star hotel (breakfast included), then tour the Slovenian capital city the following day. BRSC Meeting May 19, 2007

The meeting was held at Homewood Suites by Hilton near Baltimore's BWI Airport. Peter Porton passed out Flyers of the sanctioned Pentagon trip to Bariloche and Buenos Aires in Argentina August 11–24 priced at \$2,770. The trip is available to all clubs who are members of BRSC. Any PVSers interested in the trip should contact Peter Porton - 703 471-7791.

Review of Big Sky and Schladming showed that both trips went well. Both could have used more snow. The race course at Big Sky (Moonlight Basin) was very thin with snow cover. The buffet breakfast at the Huntley Lodge was reported to be slightly better than the buffet breakfast at the Summit Hotel. Lodging on both trips was reported as excellent. Travel was difficult into and out of the Bozeman, Montana airport. With 387 people, some long wait times resulted on commuter flights.

Judy Miller (GTU) gave an excellent presentation on the upcoming trip Feb. 23 – March 2, 2008 to Interlaken, Switzerland priced at \$1,605. The trip will include lodging in the four star Royal St. George Hotel, daily breakfast and dinner, seven nights lodging, and medical insurance. Either Istanbul or Prague can be added on for \$475 with three days of lodging available at Hilton Hotels. PVS had no leader for this trip, but interested PVSers can join the Capital Golden Skiers (contact Inge Lesjak, 703 918-0759) or some other BRSC club.

Effie Rubinstein (Sportours) gave a presentation of the Steamboat trip from Feb. 2 – 9, 2008. The price of the trip will be about \$1,400 depending on the type of lodging selected by the trip leader. PVS had no leader for this trip, but interested PVSers wishing to go to Steamboat can join the Capital Golden Skiers (contact Inge Lesjak, 703 918-0759) or some other BRSC club. We were assured the race course at Steamboat would have gobs of snow as extensive snow making is in the race area.

Mike Agnew gave a long presentation on Lake Tahoe skiing. BRSC will be going to Lake Tahoe in 2010. Heavenly at Tahoe is owned by Vail, and is the second largest ski area in U.S. Andre Gupta gave another long presentation on skiing in France. He mentioned how global warming is affecting skiing conditions in the Alps. Snow is coming much later, and glaciers are disappearing. Tropical fish are now in the Mediterranean Sea.

There were 54 sanctioned trips posted on the BRSC web site for 2007. There are two fall trips to Europe. PVSers interested in a fall trip to Europe should look at the BRSC web site. One of the trips is being run by the Baltimore Ski Club, and will visit Spain and Portugal.

The fall meeting will be hosted by the Baltimore Ski Club, and will be held on Sept 29, 2007.
