Mike Strand has consented to lead a revitalized mid-week activities program, and others will be initiating what we hope will be popular and well attended club events. As always, we need everyone's ideas, your actions to get it all done, and, of course, your participation. So, let us hear from you, as you hear from us, and have a wonderful springtime.

Winter Park receives the largest snowfall on average in all of Colorado's ski areas. This fact was evident by the great snow cover awaiting the group - 91 inch base at the summit and 81 inches at mid-mountain. The first morning, trip leader Dave Lerner led a large group on a blue run tour of the mountain. An unexpected
