We're healthy and active and we're still hurtling down the mountain!

This all became clearer when we skied in Argentina. In Bariloche you can ski for \$5 a day if you're over 65. Seems to me that if the ski resorts were accustomed to 65-year-old and older skiers, they'd charge them more. So my guess is they don't see that many, the way we do in the US.

Once again, the US leads the way! Is this a great country or what?



Piano 300: Celebrating Three Centuries of People and Pianos

To commemorate the 300th anniversary of the piano, invented circa 1700 by Bartolomeo Cristofori (1655-1732), this exhibition examines the influence of the Piano and highlights the American History Museum's distinguished collection. On view are almost two dozen instruments from the museum's collection; manuscripts by such composers as Mozart, Chopin, Liszt, Gershwin, and Ellington tools; photographs; play bilis; sheet music; and other memorabilia.

PIANO 300 explores the piano as a complex machine, a handsome work of decorative art, and the vehicle for a infinite variety of human expression, reflecting technological, cultural, and social changes from the Industrial Revolution through the present day.

THE TOUR:

We will meet in the exhibit area at the S. Dillon Ripley Center of the Smithsonian Institution (This is the little round building just to the West of the Castle) at 11:00 AM to tour the exhibit ourselves. The exhibit is on the third level down (below ground). At 12:00 there is a one hour Performance Tour in which a professional planist describes many of the planos and plays demonstrations appropriate to the music of each vintage of plano.



We will meet promptly at 10:30a.m. at the Boat House on Clopper Lake in Seneca Creek State Park, and hike the circular trail around the lake. Proceed a few hundred feet, and turn left on first paved road, and follow to the parking lot by the Boat House where we will meet for the hike.



AUGUST BICYCLING GOURMET


