PVS is moving its web site to a new hosting service. It will still be reachable as www.potomacvalleyskiers.org. The content of the new site will be much the same as the old site but with the significant addition of on-line-copies of the Toot. You will need to log in with a user name and password to access the Toot. User names have been constructed from the PVS roster in the form as FirstLast with no spaces. Capitalization must be as shown. Your password is the first 8 characters of your e-mail address as it appears in the roster. Do not type more than 8 characters of your e-mail address. Members with no listed email address should use their home phone number without the area code. Include the - in the phone number as in 555-1212.

User names are limited by the hosting software to a maximum of 12 characters. Include initials and 2-part names as shown in the roster but do **not** include spaces or periods. Do **not** type more than 12 characters of your name as it will confuse the password checking program.

User names and passwords can be changed by e-mail request to dslerner@ieee.org. There is no way to do this on line.

August 20, 2006 Ski Pioneer Alexander Cushing Dies Squaw Valley


RENO, Nev. (AP) -- Alexander C. Cushing, the <u>founder and chairman</u> of one of the world's largest and best known ski resorts, died at his summer home in Newport, R.I., the resort announced Sunday. He was 92. Cushing, who helped launch the sport in the U.S. by bringing the <u>1960 Winter Olympic Games</u> to his Squaw Valley USA near Lake Tahoe, died Saturday of pneumonia, the resort said.

Cushing opened the California resort (with the backing of relatives and friends) in 1949 with one chairlift, a rope tow and a 50-room lodge. Among other things, Cushing set standards for the ski industry with advanced lift systems and cutting-edge facilities, said Warren Lerude, a corporation board member. "Alex Cushing was one of the great pioneers in the ski industry in America. By bringing the Winter Olympics to Squaw Valley, he helped spark the development of the ski industry in the United States "Cushing bid for the games as a publicity stunt, never dreaming he might get them. The Games were the first ever televised.

Ironically, Cushing acknowledged he was never much of a skier. ''I was never a good skier,'' he told The Associated Press in 1995. ''I could get down the slopes."

(However,) Cushing <u>fought with environmentalists</u> and government officials for years over everything from ski runs to diesel fuel contamination. In 1989, the <u>Sierra Club</u> and Hewlett-Packard Co sued him.
