Directions to the Van Nuys home:

We live about two miles outside the Beltway just off Little River Turnpike – Route 236. This same road is called Main Street in Fairfax City.



From the Beltway

Take the Beltway I-495 to Little River Turnpike – Route 236, Exit 52, and take the exit towards Fairfax outside the Beltway. Go past five stoplights. The fifth stoplight is Guinea Road where the Jewish Community Center is located. Go another 100 yards (past a fire station and the Bethlehem Lutheran Church) and take the first right into Ridgelea Drive where a red brick wall and the "Ridgelea Hills" sign is located. We are the third house on the left.

From the Fairfax City Area

Take Main Street – Little River Turnpike – Route 236 (same road, three names), east towards the Beltway I-495 to the stoplight at Guinea Road where the Jewish Community Center is located. Make a U-Turn at the stoplight and head back towards Fairfax City. Go another 100 yards (past a fire station and the Bethlehem Lutheran Church) and take the first right into Ridgelea Drive where a red brick wall and the "Ridgelea Hills" sign is located. 

SKI TALK - October 2015

This is the time of year I begin getting excited about the upcoming ski season. I begin to think about all aspects of skiing. Do I need new equipment? Do my skis need tuning? How are my ski clothes? Do I need still another jacket? And, on and on. Then, the first ski magazine arrives with all of the new equipment described and tested. The most popular selling skis have a midsection of 80-90mm. This is similar to the last few years, although some new models are coming out in the 70-80mm range, which is where my skis are. So I will continue to research and I am hoping to demo skis when I get to Snowmass.





According to the latest forecast, predictions are for the best winter in 50 years because of a strong El Nino. Temperatures out west are already dropping and snow has been falling in some of the higher elevations. Don't miss out on this record-breaking winter. It's not too late to sign up for a ski trip.

Last year I wrote about the **Baltimore Longitudinal Study of Aging** https://www.blsa.nih.gov that is being conducted by the National Institute of Health. They were looking for healthy 80-year

olds last year.

This year they are recruiting anybody at least 20 years old; that covers pretty much all of us. This is a longitudinal study that has been going on for over 50 years. To be eligible you must be able to walk ¼ mile with no problems and be free of: diabetes, kidney disease, cardiovascular disease, heart attack, heart failure, angina, stroke and cancer. Dick has been accepted into the study and

recently spent three days in Baltimore while every cell of his body was analyzed. This will be repeated annually to

observe the aging process. To find out if you are eligible call: 410-350-3941.



CHESAPEAKE BAY EXCURSION TO HART-MILLER ISLAND

Tuesday, September 22, 2015

In order for large cargo ships to reach Baltimore Harbor, the shipping channels of the Chesapeake Bay and the Patapsco River have to be kept to a minimum depth of 50 feet. Construction of the Hart-Miller Island Dredged Material Containment Facility built with harbor dredge, started in the 1980s. It was used to join the remains of the eroded islands of Hart and Miller. Later, the facility was restored as native wildlife habitat.

Sixteen members of PVS participated in a tour of the Hart-Miller Island on September 22. We reached the island at 10:10am, after a short boat ride over somewhat rough water. The boats operate every day of the year.

On the island, our guide, Laura Baker, showed us a small pond and adjacent mudflats created by pumping Bay water uphill using spray guns. Safe excess water is returned to the Bay through spillways.



Although the inflow of the dredged material has stopped, the building of the habitat is Although the inflow of the dredged material has stopped, the building of the habitat is still an on-going project of the Maryland Environmental Services and the Maryland Port Administrations. The island is divided into South Cell, which is smaller and has been already restored, and the larger North Cell, which is still under planning.

We saw only a few snowy egrets at the east end of the North Cell because this is not the migration season. On the bus, Beth Kivela, another guide, showed us the bones of the wild animals on the island, and tested our ability to identify them. They included: deer, fox, muskrat, and turtle.

On the western shore of the North Cell, we went through a locked gate into a fenced area of sandy beach, camping, and picnicking facilities. This is the part of the State Park currently open to the public and accessible by boat. There is talk that the fence that separates the wild bird habitat from the public beach may be removed next year.


