

Getting to Know You:

John Lyon (Applicant Member)

I am primarily a hiker, and have taken up skiing seriously only in the last two years. I skied in college and only once, 20 years later at Tahoe - Heavenly Valley. I am a native Californian. I have tried to hike a couple of times each week. I have completed over 1,300 miles of the Appalachian Trail and hope to complete the entire 2,178 miles in the next couple of years. Last year, I overdid it and logged over 1,150 miles (650 on the AT). This year, I anticipate much less. Trips this year will include 9 days in Utah (Escalante region), 162 miles on the AT in TN/NC, maybe 10 days in ME, and 6 of us will climb to the highest points in WY and ID in August. Marty Rine got me interested in skiing again, and I am grateful. Last year, I participated in the PVS Jackson Hole trip, and I really enjoyed the PVS Steamboat Springs trip, 2011.

Anyone interested in hiking?

I propose short hikes once or twice each month on Tues or Sun or ..., leading up to the vigorous Old Rag hike in late June. Let's try an easier hike before Sky Meadows or Old Rag of White Oak Canyon.

I can lead a hike on <u>Tues 5 Apr</u> from <u>Difficult Run</u> parking lot, on left, off Rte 193 (Georgetown Pike - exit 44 off beltway - 3.6 miles west) to Great Falls Park, VA, and back.

(There are NO bathroom facilities until we reach Great Falls Park.) Let's meet in the parking lot at 9:30 AM. Pack a lunch and something to drink.

From the parking lot, we would go off to the right on the Difficult Run Trail alongside the Creek and around to the Potomac River and up the hill on the Ridge Trail/River Trail to the Great Falls Visitor Center. We would return on the Old Carriage Rd. If hikers desire, they could go the much easier route up the Old Carriage Rd, but they would be missing the spectacular views from the cliffs, and seeing what is left of the Potowmack Canal. I estimate the hike is about 6 miles.

Many thanks to Jan for hosting a most enjoyable meeting and to Ellie for her service to PVS!






Trip to Chile - Reg Heitchue & Liz Warren-Boulton:

In January 2011 we visited Torres del Paine national park in Chilean Patagonia to see some of the famous mastiffs. We were based in a very



comfortable eco lodge that was selfsufficient in power and water, and had composting toilets. Over four days, Liz did a 40 mile trek in a W shape with a group of six people up into the heads of three beautiful glacial valleys. The group spent two nights in remote but comfortable

Refugios. Because of tendonitis in his right foot Reg had to take it easy but enjoyed short day hikes and other excursions. We saw four condors, one fox, many guanacos, some flamingos, and many beautiful wild flowers.

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Do Your Thighs & Knees Hurt When Skiing?

Fred & Barb Leonhardt spent a morning at Beaver Creek, CO, skiing with inventor, Walter Dandy, while wearing his ski system called CADS (Constant-force Articulated Dynamic Struts). The system was conceived 20 years ago to alleviate quadriceps muscle fatigue and knee pain, especially among "senior" skiers. The system is visible as cords and removable thin rods from the thigh area to the ski boots. The system might seem too odd to believe, but Barb, Fred and other users report that it really, really works! Fred, in fact, bought the system after the demo & now skis without thigh pain. On Pakistani Piste, Skiers Reclaim Former War Zone (By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS, March 7, 2011)

MALAM JABBA, Pakistan (AP) — The chairlift and hotel were destroyed, the snow was not the greatest, and the apresski was tea and rice. But at least the <u>Taliban</u> were gone and no shots were fired.

That made for a good day's skiing in the Swat Valley, "the Switzerland of Pakistan" until the Taliban moved in and turned the country's only public ski resort into a training and logistics base.

The military ran the insurgents out in 2009 and now I was in Malam Jabba to fulfill my dream of carving a few turns in Swat alongside a handful of local enthusiasts, some in colorful ski suits, some in traditional robes, and some with sticks for ski poles.

Unused to foreigners, who usually are under orders to stay out of Swat for their safety, my fellow skiers stared in disbelief as I hopped out of my truck after the seven-hour trip from Islamabad, strapped skis to my backpack and set off for the main 800 meter-long (2,600 foot-long) piste.

They followed me to the slope, those who could speak English goodnaturedly asking me how on earth I came to be here. It turned out that they were holding a "Peace Ski Gala" in hopes of whipping up support for rehabilitating the resort. The skiers pushed forward a skinny man with a black beard who wore a sky-blue ski suit and white rear-entry boots. This was their best skier, they explained, and insisted I ski with him.

But first they wanted to be photographed with me, a puzzling request since mine was the only camera on hand. This would go on all day.

Finally we began trudging up the slope, past a slalom course marked with flags on wooden poles. The hike took only about 10 minutes since the snow was only good enough to ski the bottom half of the slope. Most of the conversation on the way up was dominated by a man in robes and a wool blanket who said he was a mathematician and begged for advice about getting a U.S. visa — a common pursuit in this poverty-stricken country.

Finally, from a height of nearly 2,750 meters (9,000 feet), I was able to take in the full view of waves of mountains in the Hindu Kush and Karakoram ranges. Farther north, Pakistan has some of the world's tallest peaks, including K-2, but is too poor to have much skiing infrastructure. The only areas with ski lifts are controlled by the military for training.

The Wali of Swat, who ruled the area until the 1960s, used to move his court to Malam Jabba during the summer, tourism officials told me. It may have been during one of these trips that his good friend, the Austrian ambassador, proposed a ski resort.

The Austrian government funded the chairlift and provided skis and boots, while the Pakistani government built a hotel with over 50 rooms. Construction finished in 1988, but the resort lay idle for another 10 years because of disputes over whether it should be run by the government or the private sector. The government won.

Now the hotel stands in ruins. The chairlift was destroyed by the militants and its metal scavenged for sale as scrap. All that remains of the resort is a row of a dozen metal shacks that offer tea and rice.

After my first run down the piste, as I was preparing to hike up for another, a couple of chairs were set up on the snow and I was offered tea with Matiullah Khan, a Pakistani ski hero of <u>Bode Miller</u> proportions for having represented his country at the 1996 Asian Winter Games in Harbin, China.

Khan, now 47, is a former air force officer with a bushy gray beard who wore a lavender ski suit. He runs the Malam Jabba ski school and helped organize the Peace Ski Gala. He said he hoped the government would rebuild the resort.

But the tourism officials said that would cost around \$4 million, and the government has more urgent priorities rebuilding what was destroyed in the fighting and the floods last summer that washed away houses, roads and bridges.

As I hurried uphill for a final run before it got too dark to drive home, I felt a tap on my shoulder. Someone was behind me carrying a white cup.

I had forgotten to drink my tea.

Kathmandu to Everest Advanced Base Camp --Liz Warren-Boulton & Reg Heitchue

This is an account of our 21-day trip in April and May, 2010 to Nepal and Tibet, including our trek to Everest Advanced Base Camp (ABC). Our adventure begins upon our arrival in Kathmandu where we meet the staff of the expedition company that will look after us. To ensure that we are properly prepared, our gear is checked and we are then led on a shopping trip to purchase our "puffies" and other equipment we will need for the cold nights and high altitude we will experience on the mountain. The government of Nepal is still somewhat unsettled and planned demonstrations by the Maoists caused us to make a hurried departure.

From Kathmandu we travel to the border town of Kodari and after a short stay make our way across the Friendship Bridge arriving at the Chinese border. Because of a slight mix-up in our visas, we are denied entry. After a day's wait and a thorough inspection of our bags by Chinese officials, we cross into China. We then proceed to travel to the small Tibetan town of Nylam. After a day's rest we travel to the town of Tingri at an elevation of 14,000 Ft. We are acclimatizing well and being careful to stay hydrated. We then travel by jeep past towering mountains across a 17,000 Ft pass and onto the high altitude Tibetan plateau. The road to Everest Base Camp is largely unpaved, always rocky and very rough. And then suddenly we are confronted with a most awesome

sight...Mt Everest in full view. Truly amazing! We are now at Everest Base camp, elevation 17,000 Ft. There we meet our expedition leader, **Dan Mazur**. Dan was the leader of the K-2 expedition that included Greg Mortenson who went on to write the bestselling book Three

Cups of Tea.

In base camp we meet real mountaineers who have been high on the mountain and then down to a lower altitude to regain strength before making their final ascent. We spend several days in base camp continuing the acclimatization process and visiting the ancient Rongbuk Gompa monastery that was mostly destroyed during the "cultural revolution." At the monastery we go into the underground chamber where Lamas lived for 20 or so years to escape the Chinese.

It is now time to organize our gear and prepare to trek to interim base camp. We fill our Camelbaks to the max with water that the Sherpas have boiled for us. We walk the world-famous "golden

highway," the route made

famous by Mallory and Irvine in 1924 in their quest to be the first to summit Everest. We

arrive at interim base camp at 19,000 Ft after trekking most of a day. Interim camp is located at the junction of the Far East Rongbuk and the East Rongbuk glaciers. We acclimatize for a day and then are



headed for Advanced Base Camp at 21,300 Ft. Trekking to ABC we

marvel at forests of ice pinnacles, the remnants of glaciers that have long ago receded. The trek to ABC is arduous and we are thrilled to have made it as we stagger into the mess tent for tea and warmth. ABC is a land of rock and ice. Despite the altitude and the cold, we rest comfortably knowing that we achieved our objective and that the

top of the world is just 8000 feet above us. Our second night's sleep at ABC is interrupted by what sounds like an avalanche, but is instead the roar of wind coming

cannot be located. By the time they are found it is too late and so we depart early the following morning.

Once back in Kathmandu we celebrate by staying at the iconic Yak and Yeti hotel. Two nights there and we are on our way home by way of Hong Kong and Los Angeles. What a trip! We have trekked the highest non-technical route in the world and experienced the best views of Everest in the world.

up the Rongbuk valley from the Tibetan plateau and threatening to blow our tents away with us in them!

Then it is time for the big trek all the way down to base camp. We are again hugely impressed with the spectacular ice pinnacles. As dusk closed in we are relieved to see base camp spread out below us with its assortment of colored tents. We arrive very, very
