DIRECTIONS TO HOLIDAY PARTY:

FROM THE BELTWAY:

Take Exit 54A West onto Braddock Rd. (Rt. 620). Go to the fifth stoplight and angle **left** onto Burke Lake Rd. Turn **left** at next stoplight onto Rolling Rd. Go to fourth stoplight and turn **left** onto Forrester Blvd. (called Hillside on the right side of Rolling). Go two short blocks and turn **right** onto Oakford Dr. (opposite the school on your left). Go about two blocks, and 8312 is on your **left** past the Dead End sign.

FROM SHIRLEY HWY (I-395) & I-95 South:

Exit I-95 SOUTH at Exit 169A West onto Old Keene Mill Rd. (Rt. 644). (Franconia Rd. and the Mall go to the East.) Go to the seventh stoplight and turn right onto Rolling Rd. Go through one light, past McDonald's and turn right onto Roxbury Ave. (opposite the post office). Turn at the **second right** (road curves around to the left) onto Fenwood Dr. Go one block and dead end into Oakford Dr. Turn right and the house is the fourth on the left = 8312.

FROM FAIRFAX COUNTY PARKWAY & Braddock Rd. East (Rt. 620). :

Go to Rolling Rd. at Kings Park. Turn **right**. Go to fifth stop light and turn **left** onto Forrester Blvd. (called Hillside on the right side of Rolling Rd.). Go two short blocks and turn **right** onto Oakford Dr. (opposite the school on your left). Go about two blocks, past the Dead End sign to 8312 on your **left**.

FROM FAIRFAX COUNTY PARKWAY & Old Keene Mill Rd. (Rt. 644):

Go to Rolling Rd and turn **left**. Go through one light, past McDonald's and turn **right** onto Roxbury Ave. (opposite the post office). SKI TALK

December 2013

Going to the Ski Center to listen to Brian Eardley's annual discussion of the latest ski equipment is something I look forward to each year. Brian, the Ski Center manager, never disappoints, but I always walk away thinking I need new skis! One way to test how much skis have improved over the skis you are using now, is to go to **SKI CENTER DEMO DAY** and demo the newest skis on the market. This season, the event is on **Friday, January 3, 2014, at Whitetail.** After you get to Whitetail, put on your boots and locate the Ski Center table. They will measure your boots and put pertinent information on your demo



sheet. There is no charge to demo, but you will need to leave some ID, such as a driver's license, with them.


After signing up, take a few runs on your own skis to remember how it feels. It is especially important to get your ski legs, if it's the first time on skis for the season. You can then go to the demo booths and ask for the ski you want to try. You might do some research beforehand to figure out what you are interested in. While they don't have all brands, they usually have some of the most popular models. Brian said for

an "all mountain" ski, look for a waist measuring 80-90 ml. I usually take no more than three runs on each pair of skis that I demo; the number of each type of ski is limited and people may be waiting for the skis you are using. Last year, when I was demoing a popular ski, a woman followed me the whole time so she could get them as soon as I was finished!

With a voucher from Ski Center, you can get a lift ticket for \$35, and demo as many skis as you like. However, if you are 65+, you can get a ticket at the Whitetail window for \$29; there is no need for a voucher.



John Smith will be coordinating our local ski trips. The local skiing is usually planned for Monday, Wednesday, or Friday. John normally decides on the weekend if the snow conditions will be favorable the following week. If there will be reasonable snow, he will plan a day at Liberty or Whitetail. For those who wish to carpool, there will be a designated meeting place in Gaithersburg. Contact John for further

If you want to be included on the local ski list and you were not on it last year, send an email to John Smith with a copy to David Warthen. You will then be notified, whenever there is a local ski trip planned.

Alyeska, Alaska http://www.alyeskaresort.com/ is Alaska's premier ski area, located just 40 miles from Anchorage International Airport. Mt. Alyeska's base elevation is 250 feet and the total vertical rise is 3,200 feet. The summit is accessed by the Aerial Tram and provides a panorama of the Chugach Mountains, with water views in one direction and glaciers in the other. Alyeska offers a mountain experience for all levels of skiers and riders, with 1,500 skiable acres, 113 acres of snowmaking, and average annual snowfall of 650 inches. Ski terrain composition is 11% Beginner, 52% Intermediate, and 37% Expert/Advanced.

A bonus in the last few years was that I was able to go on several great PVS trips to Snowmass, staying at the Mountain Chalet (my favorite resort and hotel). With CGS now inactive, I am happy that I and other ex-CGSers have been welcomed into PVS. Frank **Adamthwaite** profile:

As a youngster, I lived with my family in a Bronx apartment house, which was a block from Bronx Park. We celebrated Christmas Eve at St. Luke's Episcopal Church. We had a Christmas tree, roast turkey, and presents on Christmas Day. One Christmas, when I was nine or ten years old, my Aunt Lucy gave me a pair of skis. I had no idea what they were. The skies were wooden, six feet long, and had one strap across the middle of the foot. Aunt Lucy said that you stand on the skis and go down hill, and she guaranteed that it would be a thrilling ride.

At the first snowfall, I tried them out on the small hill in the park; I had little success. After a while, another skier observed what I was doing wrong, and gave me instructions. I finally learned to go down the hill in an upright position.

I observed that people went skiing on the golf course in Van Cortland Park, which was on the other side of town. On the weekend, I went to that park to ski. Adults at the park offered skiing advice. The issue of ski bindings and ski boots seemed to be the only conversation among the adults. There was a Khandahar binding, which required special boots with a steel shank in the sole, and a cable that went into a groove around the heel of the boot. There was no lift, so you had to side step or herringboned up the hill. The ride down the hill was very short and very fast. Maneuvering on the hill was restricted to a snowplow or a stem christie turn. It was a thrilling experience.

My skiing was on hold for several years. In my twenties, I joined a ski club that was part of the American Youth Hostels. The AYH sponsored ski trips to New England at cost. The bus would leave Manhattan on Friday night after work, and travel all night to some ski hill in the mountains while we slept. We skied all day Saturday and Sunday, and returned home on Sunday night. The all inclusive cost of the weekend was about twenty dollars. The skiers were an eclectic group of twenty somethings, who were out for an adventure and camaraderie with their peers. There were several rules in the club: roommates were assigned by the ski trip leader (double rooms with twin beds were the norm) and hanky-panky between boys and girls was forbidden. The consumption of alcohol was also forbidden. All of these issues became problems when I became a trip leader and was responsible for the trip. Over the long term, we had a grand time with cookies and hot-spiced cider. Mel Rubin would regale us with his guitar and songs that had naughty lyrics; he was a great folk singer who loved to ski. These ski trips were a great place to meet people and establish friendships. Romantic involvements outside of the club activities were common, and there were several marriages that started on a ski trip, including mine.

One of my sons lives in Broomfield, CO, and for the past several years, I have been going to CO to visit and ski. I usually spend two months in the mountains to ski at Keystone, Breckenridge, and A Basin. After visiting with family, I stay at various hotels and enjoy the high altitude in Summit County, the ski capital of the world. I am a member of the Loosey Goosey Ski Club, which is the former OTHG Frisco Chapter.
