
Warthens' Eastern Caribbean Cruise:

To celebrate our 10th wedding anniversary on 8 January, we took an Eastern Caribbean Cruise. Arriving a day early on 2 January, we experienced extremely cold weather in Fort Lauderdale, FL. After transferring to Port Everglades, the next day, we embarked upon the Emerald Princess along with 3,572 other "old salts" seeking warmth.

Our first stop was Princess Cays, a private island, which is part of British Eleuthera, Bahamas. Unfortunately, there was no trace of global warming, and it was much too cold to enjoy the beach.

Our next most southern port of call was St. Martin, a Dutch/French island, which was actually warm, followed northward, the next day, by St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands. Our last port of call was Grand Turk, a British island, which was also warm.

Excursion tours of St. Martin and Grand Turk revealed the unsettling abject poverty of the majority of residents, which was in deep contrast to the opulence of cruise ships in their harbors and the wealth of some temporary, island residents.



Unfortunately, I became violently ill midweek on the cruise, which was a real downer. We were not able to see St. Thomas. However, we made the best of it, and I was with my bride for our 10th anniversary. We arrived at freezing Port Everglades on 10 January, having traveled 2,574 statute miles. After a long wait, wearing our winter coats, in the freezing Fort Lauderdale airport, we flew to BWI to be hit by another blast of non-global warming, not knowing that we would miss the devastating 7.0 Haitian earthquake by 2 days.

Immediate visits to my Internist, radiology tests, and lab work revealed no bad news. Unfortunately, I had to cancel my Snowmass trip to recover. I thank fellow PVS members for their support and encouragement during my recovery.

The group came from 6 states and DC. The Mountain Chalet again provided a comfortable and welcoming home and Carolyn and Dave DeVilbiss provided their usual well organized and warm leadership.

Two of our group had to cancel out because of illness: Dave Warthen and Nancy Pigman (CGS). Dave fell ill while on a 10th anniversary cruise to the Eastern Caribbean with Marsha. 

Jackson Hole, Wyoming

February 18 to 25, 2010

As of this point in time, we have 39 people going on the trip and are awaiting word from a possible 40th person.

Slope side accommodations are at the Alpenhof Lodge, a cozy Bavarian style inn with ski in ski out access. There are five of six days lift tickets included (seniors over 65 can deduct \$100). Go on an optional trip over the Teton Pass to Grand Targhee where “the snow comes from heaven not hoses”. Cross country skiers have trails outside the front door or options to ski in Grand Teton National Park and Grand Targhee. The trip begins at Dulles, then goes to Jackson, WY, then a short bus ride to the “Hole”. We have a welcome reception of gluwain and fondue.

Full buffet breakfasts are included every day at the hotel. Two group dinners are included, pre and post trip parties, and two après ski gatherings. A short bus trip into the town of Jackson reveals many opportunities for shopping, dining, touring, skiing, and reliving history in a true western town. Yellowstone N.P. is 60 miles north accessible by snowmobile or snowcoach, and a visit to the nearby National Elk Refuge will give you the opportunity to see a herd of 12,000-15,000 elk in winter.


The Knee isn't much of a movie fan. I could never watch "The Wizard of Oz" *in Toto*.
