February 16th Meeting

Despite the big snow and warnings that parking spots were not cleaned, and given other options such as riding the Leisure World shuttle or walking, 26 members and one applicant (Herb Bennett) arrived at Celia Chen's 10th floor condo in Leisure World for the Sunday afternoon PVS meeting. When we first entered, we had signs directing us to the different food and drink stations. What a spread and variety! There was roast beef, turkey, venison, liver spread, and salmon (two ways), all labeled. Also, there was a variety of fruits, veggies, cheeses, crackers, croissants, home made warm bread, meatballs, and a couple of baked appetizers. Nuts, candies, chips and more were also around.

In the absence of President Nancy McKinley, who was home sick following a trip to Vietnam and

She gave a report on the Snowmass trip, which she was on; and Inge Lesjak, who led the BRSC trip to Vail, reported on her trip. In the absence of the Hines, Rosemary mentioned the Alyeska trip, which is the next trip to depart; and Dick Comerford reported on his BRSC trip to Cortina. Rosemary said the Ski Trip Committee was working on the trips for next year.

John Smith reported on the local weekly trips to Liberty Mountain, which had excellent conditions - better than some areas in the West. Charles Huggins told about the state of the art snowmaking equipment at Liberty Mountain, and he passed around pictures of the new resort and conference center, whose construction begins this week. The new facility will feature a grand events room, several meeting rooms, an indoor pool, seventeen hotel rooms, and two restaurants. It is a \$20 million dollar project and is scheduled to open in the spring of 2015.



The casualties of members from both home and skiing accidents were noted. Bob Jablon was there with a broken arm from a fall, and Shirley Rettig was there on crutches from being knocked down by another skier on the Utah slopes.

It was also reported that Mike Strand had fallen at their Wintergreen place and had broken a wrist.





The three new ExCom nominees were announced: Ellie Thayer, Inge Lesjak, and Paul Levy.

Ray announced that the next meeting, also a Sunday afternoon meeting, would be at Maryann Rozzell's house. A location is needed for the April general meeting as word was received that the party room at Reg Heitchue's building, where we have held this meeting for several years, would not be available this year as it was undergoing remodeling.

After the meeting, it was dessert and coffee time with selections of cake, cherry pie, and an assortment of cookies.

30 years ago, the SALT arms control discussions between the USSR and the US led to a major arms control agreement. But as the Sochi Olympics started, another kind of salt discussion was needed. Four months earlier, leading experts on salt and snow had told Sochi officials that the Alpine skiing events required more than 19 tons of salt, a crucial ingredient for melting soft snow so it can refreeze into a hard surface. But, the organizers didn't listen. Now, the Games' signature events were in jeopardy of being compromised, or even canceled.

Large grains of salt overcome soft snow conditions when a hard, icy surface is needed. The salt melts the soft snow, and when the temperature drops a layer of ice forms.

It's true! After spending more than \$50 billion on the Games, they didn't order the full amount of salt recommended. Now suddenly, Sochi needed an emergency infusion of salt. They managed to acquire it from Switzerland for only \$150 a ton; the bill would be a mere \$3,500! The ski federation helped reroute a plane.

When the plane landed in Sochi, Russian officials expedited the customs process. After passing a security check, Olympic vehicles took the salt to the mountain where emergency workers sprinkled the soft snow with big-grained salt, fresh from Switzerland. "It could have ended in disaster, but it was good teamwork." And we had the Olympics.

As they say in France, je suis finknee.
