From Potomac/Rockville/Gaithersburg: Take 270 South to 495 towards Virginia. Exit at Cabin John Parkway and continue south on the parkway until Arizona Avenue (1st traffic light after light at Chain Bridge).

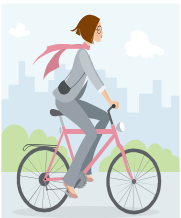
Make a left at the light on Arizona and a right on MacArthur Boulevard (1st light). Continue on MacArthur Boulevard for about 1½ - 2 miles past the Safeway on the left. Shortly after passing the Safeway, MacArthur forks to the right and Reservoir Road goes to the left. Continue on MacArthur to Q Street (the next light after the light at the fork). Make a left on Q Street. Go 1 block to the stop sign (45th St.), and make a left on 45th. Go 2 blocks and make a left (Q Lane). The street will dead end into Indian Rock Terrace. Make a right and go up hill. The Jablons' house is the 4th house up the hill on the right (a red brick and frame contemporary house).

From Virginia (Chain Bridge): At the end of Chain Bridge make a right. Follow yellow-highlighted directions above.

From Northwest D.C.: Take Nebraska Avenue to the beginning of Foxhall Road. Go south on Foxhall Road one traffic light past the intersection of Foxhall and Reservoir to Q Street. Right on Q Street. Continue on Q Street for 1 block to the stop sign (45th St.) and make a right on 45th. Go two blocks and make a left (Q Lane). The street will dead end into Indian Rock Terrace. Make a right and go up the hill. The Jablons' house is the fourth house up the hill on the right (a red brick and frame contemporary house).

From Virginia (Key Bridge): Stay in one of the left lanes at the end of Key Bridge and make a left onto M Street (may be called Canal Road). Stay in right lane and continue up the hill to the light at the beginning of Foxhall Road. Continue on Foxhall to the next light (Q Street). Turn left onto Q Street. Go one block to the stop sign (45th Street) and turn right. Go 2 blocks and turn left on Q Lane. The street will dead end onto Indian Rock Terrace. Make a right and go up the hill. The Jablons' house is the 4th house on the right (a red brick and frame contemporary house).

BIKE RIDE FROM ARLINGTON TO BETHESDA

Rosemary Schwartzbard is leading another bike ride for the Arlington 55+ bike group. PVS members are invited to join this group for a 20-mile ride from Arlington to Bethesda on Friday, **October 15, 2010, at 9am**. This scenic bike ride begins in the parking lot of Roosevelt Island.

We will ride over the Roosevelt Bridge, past the Kennedy Center, and on to Georgetown Harbor. From there we will proceed on K St. and through the new waterfront park to the Crescent Trail, which will take us to Bethesda. The trail is paved and shaded. However, from Fletchers Boat House to Bethesda (about five miles) it is somewhat uphill. In Bethesda we will stop for snacks and drinks. We will then ride back to Roosevelt Island by the same route.

For those who would like a shorter option, meet us at Fletcher's Boat House (Canal Road) for a ten-mile round trip ride.

GET THOSE SKI LEGS READY by hiking the [Lake Shore Trail at Seneca Creek State Park](#), 11950 Clopper Road, Gaithersburg, MD. Sharon Mulholland and Ingrid Dallaire will lead this 3.7 mile moderate hike around the lake. Weather should be crisp and cool, and the birds, deer, turtles, and other wild life readily visible. Hiking boots or good trail shoes are recommended.

After the hike there will be an optional lunch at [Vasilis Mediterranean Grill in Kentlands](#) (approximately 12:30 to 2:00PM) for those who want. 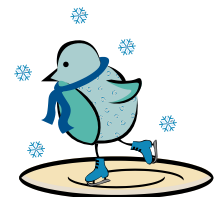

Sailboat Adventure – by Dick Schwartzbard:

It's Back to School time. That means a lot of "what I did last summer" reports.

My friend John moved his sailboat, a 40' Island Packet, from Hilton Head to Maine last June for a bit of northern cruising. In August Rosemary and I flew to Bar Harbor to board the boat for a week of sailing with John and his wife. We were blessed with beautiful sunny days the entire week. We cruised Penobscot Bay, sailed the Eggemoggin Reach and visited towns like Stonington; Castine; and Islesford on little Cranberry Island. We spent one night ashore in Belfast at The White House B&B, which is owned by good friends of ours. Belfast is a delightful town, The White House may be one of the most elegant B&Bs in the country (check it out at <http://mainebb.com/>) and nothing delights a sailor more than a good shower on land.



The women debarked and returned home and John and I started the slow slog down the coast to return the boat to its homeport in South Carolina. You should understand that such a trip proceeds at about six miles an hour. Considering that neither John nor I felt like sailing day and night but preferred to limit such activity to about ten hours a day, you can see why this is a lengthy trip. The famous Intracoastal Waterway does not start until Norfolk, Va., so we were sailing off-shore, usually but not always in sight of land. At night we would anchor or find a mooring ball to tie up to and a few times we rented dock space at a marina. Weather was great except

for a few days; we spent three nights in Gloucester, Mass, waiting out a storm. By the morning of the third day we got impatient, decided to believe the weather forecast of winds only 15-20 knots, put on our foul weather gear and set out into the rain. Surprise, surprise! At one point our wind gauge registered 40 knots of wind! With that and the current, the GPS showed us moving at nine knots (over the ground), considerably faster than our typical six miles an hour. Unfortunately, with the 10-12 foot waves, we were moving in a lot of directions at the same time. But that was only for one day and certainly not enough to spoil an otherwise great voyage.



We sailed down the coasts of Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts. We went through the Cape Cod Canal. We sailed down Long Island Sound past Rhode Island and Connecticut to the northern end of New York City. By that time the forecasts for Hurricane Earl indicated that we should tuck in for a few days and we did so at the Harlem Yacht Club at City Island, just north of the Throgs Neck Bridge at the entrance to the East River. Anticipating five nights at a mooring ball, I took the opportunity to jump ship and come home. It was a great trip but after three weeks I needed a bed that wasn't rocking. John, being the intrepid sailor that he is, continued solo and arrived in Hilton Head some three weeks later.

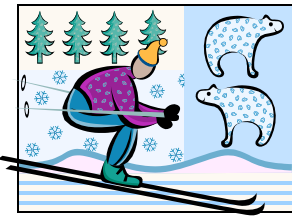
