

Greetings PVS Members,

Hello PVSers! I am writing this month about a change of club policy regarding the distribution of the TOOT. At the outset, I acknowledge that change is sometimes hard and sometimes creates a hardship. Nonetheless, please let me make the case for why change is needed.

ExCom has voted to cease mailing paper copies of the TOOT to those members who have email starting with next month's (October's) distribution of the TOOT. The most important reason is not the cost; Why? although the cost is considerable. The club treasurer estimates that the money spent for "snail mail" distribution of the TOOT usually constitutes one-third of the club's annual expenditures. Presently, 35 members receive a mailed paper copy of the TOOT each month. The monthly cost varies. However, it is estimated that snail mail costs the club \$70.00 per person every year.

However, that is not the underlying impetus for the change. The reason is the cost in person hours, the hassle, the burden, the trips to Staples and the like, the trips to the post office, and the preparation of the mailing packets. In short, it is all the extra work that someone has to do each month. Further, this policy is in line with the policies of an ever-growing number of organizations, including other ski clubs in the area.

Twenty-four members who presently receive a mailed version of the TOOT have email addresses and receive electronic versions of the club roster four times a vear. Next month those members will receive the TOOT via electronic version only. If a member has a problem opening the attachment, please contact Dave Warthen, one of the club's computer geniuses, for help.

Eleven PVSers have not provided the club with email addresses. For those who do have email service. please provide an address to me or to Dave Warthen. There are a few members who do not have email. For the time being, we will continue to mail a paper copy of the TOOT to those few.

I ask those affected to be receptive to the change. As always, give me a call, (301) 330-2953, if you want to discuss this or any other PVS issues.

Looking forward to seeing you all at the September General Meeting at the Leonhardts and hearing about all your wonderful summer vacations.

Segway Tour of National Harbor, Wilson Bridge, Alexandria – June 28

Twelve enthusiastic PVSers met at the Segway Store at National Harbor for a real adventure, organized by Barbara Leonhardt. The group included Carolyn and Dave DeVilbiss, Louann Eadie, Dick and Sandy Laeser, Leona Mahallati, Ruth Powers, Liz and Serge Triau, Dave Warthen, and Barbara and Fred Leonhardt. Most of the group had some previous Segway experience, but a few were trying them for the first time, and others of us needed refresher instructions before starting out. We divided into 2 groups of 6, each led by a guide. The guides had microphones that fed into the receiver and ear phones that we each wore, enabling us to receive instructions, warnings, and commentary on the sights we were seeing.





We started out touring National Harbor, which gave our bodies a chance to learn (or to remember) how to control the Segways in a benign environment (little auto or pedestrian traffic and smooth, flat terrain). We saw the Awakening statue, restaurants, hotels, and the dock for the water taxi. We then followed the crushed stone trail along Smoot Cove and the bicycle overpass over the Woodrow Wilson Bridge to the bike trail that runs along the northern side of the bridge. We stopped on the overpass and on the bridge to enjoy the views, before continuing on to Alexandria. The guide pointed out many historical sights in Old Town, including Jones Point Lighthouse (1856), the John Carlyle House (founder of Alexandria) (1753), and the 7 foot-wide blue "Spite" house (1830).

We retraced the bike trail over the Wilson Bridge and headed back to National Harbor. Our guide said that we covered about 18 miles. At the end, we were all quite tired, especially our feet, but still excited about our experience. We were ready for a great lunch at McCormick and Schmick's,

where we were joined by Marsha Warthen. Many thanks to Barbara for organizing this fun event.

Finger Lakes Wine Country Trip – August 26-28

A beautiful full moon and daytime temperatures in the 70s added to the perfection of this unique weekend. Our hosts, Susan and David Payne, live in a charming farmhouse that overlooks their picture-perfect vineyard on Lake Keuka in the Finger Lakes region of New York. Twenty PVSers joined this second Finger Lakes weekend extravaganza that began late Thursday afternoon with a tasting at a distillery. About half of our group arrived in time to taste the gin, vodka, whiskeys, and liquors. The favorite was the cherry liquor. The owner of the distillery gave us a tour and discussed the process of making whiskey. From there we went to a Brew Pub in Watkins Glen to meet the rest of the group and indulge in good food and an array of beers and wine.

Friday morning was free for optional activities. Some in the group walked "The Gorge," some 800 steps and three miles, to view the fantastic falls and geological formations; one biked; others went to the Corning Museum; and a few drove their cars on the Watkins Glen International Race Track. We all met for lunch to trade stories. Bonnie and Bill Sweeney, our Indiana members, met us for lunch with their 20-month old grandchild. They drove three hours from Ft. Drum, New York, to meet us. Jan Marx drove in from Minneapolis for the weekend and Mark Schwartzbard came from Brooklyn to spend a day with the group.

Our next stop was the Payne Vineyard, which was a highlight of the trip. David took us on a tour of the vineyard and discussed the various grapes as we sampled them. They grow grapes used for Merlot, Cabernet, and unique Black Russian wines in addition to growing a dwindling supply of Concord grapes. It was fascinating to taste the grapes and try to guess which grapes were used in which wines. Also, we learned about the BRIX scale, a graduated scale used on a hydrometer that measures the weight of sugar per volume of solution. The grapes are at their peak when the BRIX number is about 21. Those we tasted, between 15 and 20, were almost mature enough to harvest. Because of the warm summer, the grapes are maturing early this year and harvesting has begun.

After sampling the grapes, we went to Ravine's Winery to sample more wine. We ended the day at Pleasant Valley Wine Company, which used to be Taylor Wines. A first for most of us was a taste of Chocolate Lab wine (think wine, chocolate, and caramel), which is popular with the young crowd and found a few converts among some of us. We were met by the owner of the Pleasant Valley Wine Company, who gave us a personal tour of the old buildings which were built for Taylor Winery from 1860 to the 1890s. Because Susan works with the owner, we got a VIP tour through parts of the buildings that are not open to the public. We were taken down to the Caves and saw gigantic wine casks and rooms with thousands of bottles. We were then invited into the private library filled with antiques and served champagne and canapés. From there, we were escorted to the lovely dining room in the Pleasant Valley wine cellar. In the depths of the building we were served an elegant four-course gourmet dinner paired with wines. Some of the wines were from McGregor Winery made from the grapes grown at the Payne Vineyard. As if that were not enough, music was played by Shepherd Pie a talented duo on guitar and percussion. Members of PVS accompanied on tambourines, cymbals, and other such instruments. Entertainment was provided by many of our members including Dick Comerford, Bob Jablon, Eloise, Sharon Mulholland, and others. Certainly a night to remember!

The following morning we boarded the schooner True Love, which was featured in the movie High Society. We sailed around Lake Seneca on a picture-perfect morning as we sipped coffee, ate pastries, and told stories to our fellow crewmates. Then we were off to a winery, lunch, another winery, a shopping spot, and a brewery culminating the day with a dinner at Seneca Harbor Station with more wine and more good food. Several members were seen carrying cases of wine to the bus. A fantastic time was had by all. Susan and David planned a very special weekend. We thank them for all of the work in putting it together and the graciousness of their hospitality.

Climbing Mt. Quandary by Ellie Thayer:

Mt. Quandary - 14,250 feet - is one of Colorado's fifty-four mountains exceeding 14,000 feet. These peaks are affectionately known as 14ers. I was convinced by my son and daughter-in-law to scale this 14er after our initial successful 14er climb last summer. Jack, who tore his ACL skiing at Jackson Hole in February, decided at the last minute that he would not be left



behind. We began climbing at 6:45am on Wednesday, June 30, 2010, and ended our descent eight hours later. The climb was 6.7 miles round trip. The trail, when discernable, was rugged. Nearly half was scree, i.e., loose piles of rocks. In a few places, semi-steps fashioned from big rocks had been set in place. However, they were slanted instead of flat and of varying heights. The trail was very steep, especially the last fifth of the hike to the summit. We could not have done it without our trekking poles.

The views were spectacular. From the dry top of Mt. Quandary we could see Mt. Democrat, which we climbed last year, where the rain was pouring down in buckets. In the far distance we glimpsed Pike's Peak. There was some snow on top, but not enough to obscure the trail. Jack plunged thigh deep in soft snow and was helped out by a couple of young hikers passing by. There were a lot of "young" hikers. Jack and I were the oldest duo on the mountain. Perhaps we were the slowest too, but we did not mind.

Despite the challenges or perhaps because of them, it was an exhilarating experience. The scenery and vistas were beautiful. The PB&J sandwiches on the top were fine dining. Most of all, just doing it produced a satisfying communal sense of accomplishment.

Warthens' New England/Canada Cruise:

Eliminating air travel and TSA packing, we embarked upon the RC Enchantment of the Seas in Baltimore on 12 August for a 9-day cruise. Although our ship (989' L) was larger than the Titanic (882' L), it was one of the smaller RC cruise ships with only 1,125 staterooms. How nice to unpack once for the entire trip!



After one day at sea, we disembarked in Portland, ME for a tour of the city, which included the famous Head Light lighthouse and Kennebunkport. We quickly discovered lobster

rolls and clam chowder for lunch.

The next morning, we disembarked via tender to Bar Harbor, ME, for a tour of the Lobster Oceanarium and Acadia National Park. A drive to Cadillac Mt. in Acadia gave us a breathtaking view of Bar Harbor and our cruise ship.

The next morning, we disembarked in St. Johns, New Brunswick for a double decker, pink bus tour of the city, which included the public King's Square gardens, the Bay of Fundy (with average tides of 28' - max at

He also said that he tried never to eat on an empty stomach and referred to a class of snow boarders as "Boarding School." Such was his sense of humor.

Knox and Karen moved to South Carolina five years ago but kept up their membership in PVS.

Knox will be missed by all who knew him.
