**Take Chain Bridge onto N. Glebe Road, crossing into Virginia**. Go straight (not turning right on Chain Bridge Road). As you go up the hill to Glebe Road, do not take the turnoff to Military Road. At the top of the hill after a big curve, the first right is River Street – there is a sign there that says <u>Chain Bridge Forest</u>. **Turn right onto River Street**. Go 3 blocks on River. You go down a hill and up the next. At the top of that hill (the third left) **turn left on Highwood**. Go to the very end, about 4 or 5 blocks, ending in a cul-de-sac. We're at the back of the cul-de-sac. Take the Georgetown Pike exit (exit 44) east.
Turn left onto Route 123, Chain Bridge Road.
Turn right onto N. Glebe Road. Then, follow directions highlighted in yellow above on page 1.
From Virginia via the Dulles Toll Road:
Merge onto Route 123 N via exit 19B toward McLean.
Turn right onto N. Glebe Road. Then, follow directions highlighted in yellow above on page 1.

#### **Directions to the hike:**

From the Beltway, exit onto 270 N and then take exit 10 toward MD-117 W, which becomes Clopper



Road. The entrance to Seneca Creek State Park is to your left. Pass the gatehouse (unattended), turn right at the T intersection, and go left at the sign for the playground (with restrooms) and the boathouse. There is ample parking at the playground parking lot. Following the easy hike over rolling terrain with scenic vistas of the lake, we will head for lunch at 12:45 pm at the Fontina Grille in the King Farm Village Center.

## **Directions to the Fontina Grille from Clopper Lake:**

From Seneca Creek State Park head back to 270 S and take the Shady Grove exit and stay right. After 0.3 mile, turn right on Gaither Road; go 0.5 mile and turn left on King Farm Blvd. After 0.1 mi, see Fontina Grille on the left at Pleasant Drive, and park on the street. 801 Pleasant Drive, Rockville, MD 20850. # NATIONAL HARBOR FERRIS WHEEL RIDE AND HIKE Friday, October 24



The new **Capital Ferris Wheel** at National Harbor is a sight to behold. It is built at the end of a pier on the edge of the water. There are 42 enclosed, climate-controlled cabins making it a very comfortable ride. As you soar 180 feet above the Potomac River waterfront, you will marvel at the incomparable views. Sights visible include the White House and Capitol, the National Mall, Arlington Cemetery, City of Alexandria, Prince George's County, the Wilson Bridge and the lush parklands throughout the DC-Maryland-Virginia region. Join us for this exciting urban hike to National Harbor from Alexandria. We will park our cars at Jones Point under the Wilson Bridge and leave from there at 10:30am, so come a little earlier to have time to park. From there, we will proceed to the entrance of the bridge. There is a 12-foot wide pedestrian/bike path on the north span of the Wilson Bridge. The path is wider than the typical bike path and there are three rest areas equipped with

telescopes where you can stop and enjoy fantastic views of Washington and Alexandria. It is approximately 2.5 miles from the entrance of the path on S. Washington St. in Alexandria to National Harbor (add another 0.2 mile from parking lot). We will stop and look at the views from the bridge. Once at National Harbor, we will see the statue "The Awakening" at its new home and then proceed to the Capital Ferris Wheel. After riding on the Ferris Wheel, we will go to lunch at one of the many places at National Harbor. Then we will hike back to our cars at Jones Point – another 2.5+ miles.

## PVS/BRSC SKIING AND SIGHTSEEING ADVENTURE MT. BACHELOR AND BEND, OREGON JANUARY 31-FEBRUARY 7, 2015

Mt. Bachelor is the largest ski area in central Oregon, with terrain for all levels. The mountain is an extinct volcano, and you can ski with full lift service 360 degrees off the top for 3,365 vertical feet to the base, often through light, dry powder! It has the highest skiable elevation of any resort in Oregon or Washington and is far enough inland for drier snow conditions. The resort gets an average of 462 inches of snow a year on 88 runs, served by 10 lifts. (Mt. Bachelor is adding over 400 acres of ski terrain that is scheduled for opening in 2015). In addition, the resort has more than a dozen cross-country trails, 35 miles of which are groomed. The mountain grooms 40 of the 88 runs. Volunteer Mountain Hosts will ski with you all or part of the day, at your request.



The mountain is a 30-minute bus ride from Bend where you will be staying in the newly upgraded Double Tree Hotel. There is an indoor pool and hot tub. You can walk to the historic downtown district of Bend with lots of shops and restaurants. Buses will pick you up at the hotel and take you directly to the mountain where you will store your skis. No long walks are involved. Non-skiers will have options to go to Crater Lake, the town of Three Sisters, wine tasting, dog sledding, snowshoeing and more. Included in this package are:

- 7 Nights Lodging at Double Tree Hotel
- Round Trip Air into Redmond (20 minutes from hotel)
- Transfers to and from Hotel
- 5 of 6 Day Lift Ticket (discounted rates for seniors)

#### Passage to Eastern Europe River Cruise -

by Carolyn and David **DeVilbiss** We have indulged our new passion for river cruises for yet a third summer. Since this did not seem a propitious year for our planned river cruise to the Ukraine, we switched itineraries and opted for a Viking River Cruise from Budapest to Bucharest. Last summer we went the other way: from Budapest to Amsterdam on the Danube, the Main-Danube Canal with its amazing series of locks, to the Rhine.

But first we flew to Prague, for a three-night pre-trip. David had not been to Prague, and Carolyn was delighted with the changes since her visit there in the early 1990s, shortly after the end of the Soviet occupation. The economy has greatly improved, with a very active tourism, food on the shelves in the bustling grocery stores, and most of the old buildings beautifully painted and restored. Our hotel was in walking distance of Old Town, the Jewish quarter, and Charles Bridge. After a guided walking tour in the morning, we were bused to the other side of the river to the Prague Castle complex, where we were hosted for a private lunch, lecture, concert, and tour of the art works at Lobkowicz Palace. The palace was reopened to the public in 2007 as a private family museum housing a permanent exhibit drawn from the extensive Lobkowicz Collections. Subsequent to the restitution laws of the 1990s, both the palace and most of the confiscated art works have been returned to the family. Before leaving Prague, Carolyn



achieved her goal of climbing all 186 steps of the famous "Powder Tower" with her new knee. No problem!!! David, too.

We bused overland to Budapest, and were installed in another fine riverfront hotel. There we met up with our British friends Martin and Julie (we met them two years ago on the Russia cruise, and have traveled with them since). They had found a delightful outdoor restaurant



nearby with roving Gypsy musicians, which we enjoyed for the next two nights, while we caught up on the year's events. After more touring in Budapest, we boarded the Viking Rinda for our cruise down the Danube. We passed through the plains of Hungary, through Croatia, Serbia, Bulgaria, and Romania, with stops every day for land excursions. Our first landing in Kalocsa, Hungary, included a wonderful horsemanship performance at the Bakodpuszta Equestrian Center. On later stops we toured

many medieval and more recent historical sights and learned about the very complicated history of this region. We



especially enjoyed an afternoon bus trip to Kovacica, Serbia, where we visited a violin maker's shop and a "naive art" gallery, with work from local folk artists. The

most scenic part of the cruise was through the "Iron Gates", which resembles fjord territory, but the view was somewhat muted due to the foggy weather-nonetheless spectacular. We were entertained by several different groups of folk dancers and musicians, including a Bulgarian Children's Folk Performance troupe.

Local and on-board guides provided a variety of interpretations from both old and recent history. We heard their stories about growing up under communism, wars and the redrawing of boundaries with the disassembling of Yugoslavia, the differences of opinion between older and younger generations, and their hopes for



the future. The economy in these countries is clearly struggling more than those we visited farther up the Danube.

Our last night was spent in a hotel in Bucharest, after transport by bus. There we visited the outdoor Village

Museum, a park with authentic dwellings brought from all regions of the country, most with wonderful thatched roof construction. After a final dinner with our good friends, we flew home to our "real world." Next year's tour will be to the South of France, and we can't wait!

# In Memory of Robert Clyde Harmon (84) 1930 – August 10, 2014

Bob Harmon was an active member of PVS from 1990 until he was unable to participate any longer after 2011. Those of us who knew Bob will miss his low-key charm. Bob was born in Auburn, Maine in 1930 and carried the unmistakable "down-east" accent all of his life, responding with good grace when chided about it.

Bob grew up in Bridgton, Maine, graduating from Bridgton High School in the class of 1948. He received his BA degree from the University of Maine in 1952, and his MA from the University of Maine in 1961.

Welcome to Bridgton, Maine "The Maine Place for All Seasons"



He served in the US Army from 1952 to 1954. Bob worked for the Refugee Relief Program in Germany from 1955 to 1957 and for the National Security Agency from 1958 to 1961. He worked as a civilian in Military Intelligence in Paris from 1961 to 1965.

In 1971, Bob received his PhD from George Washington University. He was Professor of German at Gallaudet College for the Deaf from 1967 to 1986, retiring from Gallaudet in 1986.



Bob was an avid skier, and those who skied with him appreciated his seemingly effortless form on the slopes. He traveled to many countries and took part in PVS ski trips both domestic and foreign. He skied with PVS in Argentina and enjoyed a PVS trip to Chile to ski (at least, until his back-pack was sliced open surreptitiously in Santiago, and his camera removed by the thieves). On one of his last overseas ski trips, Bob joined PVS in Norway, Sweden and Estonia.

Bob spoke other languages as well as German, but was never one to boast of his ability. His widerange of interests included hiking and tennis, which he claimed kept him in shape.

His particular love and talent, however, lay in his painting. He was a skilled artist and held a show of his beautiful work at a gallery for his friends. Bob is remembered as a gentle soul, always polite and soft-spoken; he was a gentleman and friend to many in PVS, and we're sorry to lose such an accomplished, distinguished friend.

According to <u>Marvin Hass</u> and the New York Times, Park City may not be open this winter for skiing due to a lease dispute. For years, the Park City Corp had a lease that would make a rent-controlled Manhattanite jealous. They leased ski slopes, for \$155,000 a year for 2,800 acres of prime downhill terrain--a real bargain in a town where an unfinished lot goes for \$1.9 million. But in 2011 Park City Corp made "one of the most monumental blunders in Utah history": It failed to renew its lease on time.

Enter Vail Resorts. In 2013, Vail signed a lease to run the nearby Canyons Resort. It also gave Vail the right to lease the 2,800 acres of disputed ski slopes. But Park City Corp. won't go quietly. If forced to leave, the ski resort said it would take its snow-making equipment, the ski lifts and anything else not fixed to the ground. Further, Park City Corp. still owns the entrance to the mountain. They also own water rights critical for early-season snow-making.

Hotel bookings for this winter have not suffered yet but restaurateurs are getting edgy. "It's damaging to real estate values. We've never faced anything like this." Stay tuned...
