Here are the books we shared in April:

- Mary Ellena Ward joined us to discuss a mystery by Dick Francis, "Wild Horses," involving both horses and the movie industry and offering up this perfectly relevant quotation for us readers: "Fantasy supplies what life doesn't."
- Ellie Thayer brought us Nigerian author Abi Daré's "The Girl with the Louding Voice," the inspiring story of a Nigerian girl's dreams and her eventual accomplishments in overcoming the many obstacles in her path.
- Marianne Soponis has been reading from "The Best American Essays" edited by Joyce Carol Oates and Robert Atwan. Marianne noted the valuable insights provided in the essays by many of America's finest writers.
- Jan Marx has been listening to books on rides in the car and discussed for us, "This Dame for Hire" by Sandra Scoppettone, a complicated mystery set in post WWII New York City.
- Bonnie Sweeney felt "The Book of Lost Friends" by Lisa Wingate shed light on attempts made by families separated by slavery to locate their loved ones after the Civil War. Though fictional, it included actual newspaper ads of the period.



Anticipating a cold and windy day with possible rain or snow, we were delightfully surprised. We found blue skies and a wind that helpfully "blew" us inside to a warm, cozy atmosphere. The Inn is currently undergoing some renovation, but the restaurant was bright, and the chef was ready for us!



We enjoyed getting to know each other better, sitting at well-distanced tables but close enough to overhear conversations from Marna Blanchette and Mike Carberry, Carolyn and Dave DeVilbiss, Betty and Dick Comerford, Kathi Daylor and Brian Drinkwater, John and Blanca Hotaling, Jan Marx, Herb Bennet, and Clare and Marianne Soponis. The menu was especially printed for us and created some difficulty in making a choice. We toured the many nooks, crannies and other rooms to be used for food and beverage service. A quick look outside on the terrace showed us the barn, being refurbished for a June graduation, already booked! Some of our group climbed the stairs to

view bedrooms; others took time to peer down the old well – initially outdoors to get water for the stagecoach horses – now inside and covered with glass.

It was a worthwhile day trip to Wayside Inn, celebrating "new beginnings" for an old, historical, and treasured place.
