

<u>President's Message</u>

Think Skiing!

To think skiing means, "Think Snow." It means not any kind of snow. It means perfect, skiable snow, smooth snow, snow without ice. Snow for the best skiing.

This kind of snow needs the right weather. Days should be sunny and clear, but at the same time crispy and cool. There will not be any sub-zero degree Fahrenheit temperatures reminiscent of pre-climate change Vermont nor will there be any high, cutting cold winds. Snow will not only not melt, but will keep a firm, champagne texture. These Goldilocks days will have the perfect ambience.

Our perfect skiing weather will have other elements. Heavy snow should fall, but only on ski mountains and only beginning about 5:00 PM daily and ceasing about 8:00 PM so that groomers can finish their work. The snow should not fall on roads necessary to get to and from mountains.

Critics may doubt the chances of our getting such ideal, highly directed snow conditions. However, in *Peanuts* rain would fall solely on the affected character. There is no reason why snow, frozen rain, cannot fall locally where it is needed and not fall elsewhere. We have a capitalistic system and science to make this happen.

Whether weather will allow these ideal conditions depends on – you guessed it – weather or whether. Serious difficulties threaten our reaching the ideal. According to numerous articles in the *New York Times*, dutifully gathered by Google, climate change is causing warmer weather, which is reducing many resorts' days of good skiing. Compounding this problem is the fact that on other days climate changes impact air currents bringing frigid Artic air south, making it too cold for people to ski comfortably. Problems have solutions. I suggest the following to maximize perfect skiing days.

My first is to ski in Paris, France. If it gets either too hot or too cold, one can go into a *patisserie* or into a bar and find good weather inside. Paris has many of both. Steamboat

says that it first recognized Colorado's champagne snow and Utah and Colorado say that they have champagne skiing. However, Paris' domestic champagne is even more bubbly. *cont' pg2.*

President's Message, continued:

After drinking cool, smooth champagne, PVS members will feel that they are gliding down the Champs-Élysées or, better yet, that they are sitting at a Saint-Germain-des-Prés café, looking at others glide down the Parisian street-slopes. Notably, the Champs-Élysées goes downhill from the Arc de Triomphe, perfect for skiing. If PVS members at a Saint-Germain-des-Prés café order the right French tarte, preferably apricot, with drinks to match, they will surpass Steamboat's champagne snow.

Some PVS members may find Parisian skiing insufficient because its lack of moguls. Unlike Washington, D.C. and New York, Paris' streets are maintained. Therefore, skiers may have to seek other areas to meet their skiing needs. Unfortunately, whether they can maintain perfect ski weather at such ski areas is in doubt. However, they can seed clouds above where they choose to ski.

As I suggested, meeting the standards of having snow over and only over desired ski slopes will take carefully, applied science and even advanced engineering. I suggest using hot air balloons, which are found near multiple ski areas. As skiers descend, they can release gas into clouds to direct snow as needed. This methodology would be like pipetting in biology, chemistry and the like where scientists drop liquids into tubes to direct properly measured amounts to their destination. This process has been used for many years and despite appearances is claimed accurate. However, some observers like Robert Kennedy are skeptical and say that results need study.

In the event that cloud seeding does just not work, PVS can support the building of gigantic walls just west of their chosen ski slopes. Such walls would simulate mountains. As air rises, allowing it to hold less liquid, snow will fall. Where such walls are not allowed, for example, near airports, snow blowers could create air barriers still causing snow to drop where it is needed.

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An additional alternative would be to import snow as done to meet the needs of the 2014 Sochi Olympics. Because of tariffs and other factors, there may be space on planes and container ships to facilitate such snow transports. And Soda Stream has proven that carbon dioxide can be added

to water to spray snow over slopes.

My suggestions do not propose to reduce carbon emissions as this might generate undue political opposition.

As a near final alternative solution to obtaining smooth skiing over long seasons, PVS might consider installing magic carpets on ski slopes. The magic carpets could use bleached white weaves to look like snow and have pillows on the side least one fall and need to rest. These carpets can be used for both indoor and outdoor skiing. Places like Dubai and some ski lifts in the United States use them, although in Dubai, because of the weather, skiing can only be indoors.

But if all these carefully considered suggestions to achieving the perfect skiing ambience are unacceptable, there is one final option. Book ski trips, say like for mid-January at Snowmass. With luck the weather and therefore the snow will be perfect, so perfect that even the ski club president will find that his balance permits him to ski. PVS members will beautifully, ecstatically glide down the slopes. We reasonably hope.

Here are the books we shared in May:

<u>Karen Knopes</u> headed back to the ocean with "The Wide Wide Sea." Author Hampton Sides chronicles the last voyage of Captain Cook in 1776. Cook came upon Hawaii by accident and became a figure of worship to the inhabitants before his death on the island. **5***

<u>Rosemary Schwartzbard</u> brought us the story of Judith Jones, a publisher who championed Anne Frank's diary as well as Julia Child's early work. Author Sarah Franklin wrote "The Editor" which elaborates on the remarkable persistence and foresight of Jones. **5***

<u>Marianne Soponis</u> abandoned the life of Thurgood Marshall and gave us a murder mystery, "Red Ultimatum" by former Marriott colleague Edwin Fuller and his writing partner Gary Grossman. A plane crash, an attack in Cairo, and a kidnapping in Panama are all part of this "very gripping" novel Marianne gives **5***.

<u>Ellie Thayer</u> has been engrossed in "Prisoners of Geography" by Tim Marshall. Marshall details the impact a country's geography has on its politics and the world around it. She noted that she was reading the section on the historical division between Pakistan and India when the region recently erupted. Per Ellie, it should be updated from 2015. **5***

<u>Bonnie Sweeney</u> decided on the "enjoyable" murder mystery "The Maid" by Nita Prose. Though not a literary masterpiece, per Bonnie, the story provided details of what it is like to be a maid in a hotel along with insight into the protagonist's social interaction difficulties and, of course, the mystery! **4***

<u>Jan Marx</u> discovered "The Angels of Morgan Hill" by Donna VanLiere which takes place in 1947 in Tennessee. A Black family moves to town to work and faces discrimination. They suffer a tragedy and receive help that makes ripples throughout the community. **4.5***

<u>Bob Jablon</u> again gave us a welcome history lesson with Russell Shorto's "Taking Manhattan," a nonfiction account of the Dutch influence in New York. The Dutch approach of religious and country-specific tolerance led to New York City becoming the melting pot that it is today. **5***

<u>Mary Hubbard</u> looked to a bestselling novel by Kristin Hannah, "The Nightingale." Hannah was inspired by the story of a Belgian woman who helped downed Allied pilots escape Nazi Germany. In this historical fiction account, the protagonist and her sister with opposing views both joined the French resistance and reconnect at the end of the war. **4.5***

<u>Nancy McKinley</u> listened to the "almost-poetic" Booker Prize winner from 2024 "Orbital" by Samantha Harvey. Harvey's 6 astronauts from 5 countries on the international space station experience 12 orbits around the earth in 24 hours while reflecting on earth from afar and on their individual paths to a life dedicated to space exploration. **5***

Washington DC Ski Travel Show

It's an opportunity to meet representatives and tour operators from various ski resorts and swap stories with other skiers. There were 9 venders, which is less than in past years. Snowmass, Taos, Elk Mountain, SkiCanada, Stratton, Smugglers Notch, Mt Bachelor, Banchi Tours and Interlachen all had tables set up. We had a chance to talk to these folks and collect information and some swag, as well as, mingle with other BRSC members. According to the Snowmass rep there will be a couple of new chair lifts this upcoming season. The Elk Camp quad lift will be replaced with a high-speed 6 pack lift. A new Cirque T-Bar lift will replace the existing platter lift.

2027 BRSC Trips

Back to planning ski trips which included a discussion for **2027**. <u>Breckenridge, Colorado</u> was selected for Western Carnival, January 30 - Feb 6, 2027. It has the capacity for large groups. All lodging is at the base of the resort. There are affordable and self-contained space for events. The lift pass would be good at Keystone, as well, with the option of a shuttle.

It was decided that <u>Drei Zinnen, Italy</u> will be the <u>Eurofest</u> ski trip, with suggested dates of March 6 - 13, 2027. It is a new up and coming ski destination located in the Dolomites, also known as the Three Peaks. The World Ski Awards named Drei Zinnen Dolomites Italy's best ski resort in 2024 beating out Cervina, Cortina and Val Gardena.

Quebec was chosen for Winterfest in 2027 with specific dates to follow. As always this would be a bus trip.

<u>Trip Details</u>

Once again, we will be staying at the Snowmass Mountain Chalet (SMC) which offers a convenient ski in, ski out location. The "LAND ONLY" package includes: transportation to and from Aspen airport; 5- day Senior (65 and older) lift pass (good for all four ski areas in the Aspen complex, free shuttle bus); 7 nights lodging (double occupancy); luggage handling; buffet breakfast, soup lunch, welcome reception, pizza party and farewell group dinner to celebrate our trip. Additional nights at Snowmass are an option based on availability.

Trip insurance is available through www.Encompasse.com and is <u>highly recommended</u>.

The Basic Package price is based on 2 people per room. We have 16 rooms reserved consisting of Standard and Deluxe, King and Queen/Queen rooms.
